

# Summer Style Parade Added Attraction At Cooking School

With 1920 favorites as musical background, a local girl, Miss Karen Dean, and Rita LaRoy models showed up-to-the-minute summer fashions Thursday and Friday prior to the Herald-Southern California Gas Co.-sponsored Cooking School.

Styles from Mari-Lyn's Dress Shop, ran the full gamut of milady's wardrobe, including playclothes, casual morning wear, dressy afternoon frocks, and cocktail and formal attire. Again featured, as at so many shows this year, were new synthetic fabrics requiring no ironing, cottons with texture, coordinating "separates" with a one-piece look, necklines with back interest, crinoline under-slips to add flare to bouffant skirts, stoles of every description, and the ever-good black and white and navy and white color schemes.

### SAILCLOTH IMPORTANT

Durable sailcloth in white and bright shades took the spotlight in playclothes. Pedal-pusher outfits emphasized tight-fitting trousers and sleeveless tops, co-ordinated to give a one-piece look.

Permanent pleats showed up surprisingly around the bottom of a chocolate-colored, one-piece bathing suit, styled to double duty for sunning and swimming. The same tiny pleats were shown again from shoulder to hemline in a dressy, nylon chiffon navy frock, frivolously feminine with a red taffeta under-slip gleaming beneath the sheer fabric.

An eye-catcher among cottons with the added touch of texture was a quilted cotton beige with black interest at the scoop neckline and around the flaring skirt. Yellow felt daisies applied on the black binding gave an added touch of color.

### BLACK AND WHITE

The full skirt was emphasized by a crinoline underslip, also worn with a black and white check taffeta featuring perky white pique bows at the high neckline and cuffs of the short sleeves. A black patent cinch belt, one of the most popular waistline trimmings this season,

gave the final touch to the ensemble.

Navy and white, often with an added touch of red, showed up again and again in the fashion parade.

In the tailored line was a one-piece navy frock with white stitching down the bodice and side-pockets of the skirt to give a slenderizing line. A rayon linen navy blue suit, fashioned with wide white lapels and deep cuffs on three-quarter length sleeves also featured a slenderizing line. Embossed flowers on lapels and cuffs gave an added touch of texture to the afternoon ensemble.

Another linen was made with navy skirt and navy, red, and white polka dot jacket with a flirty pepum.

### COCKTAIL COTTON

A chartreuse cotton for cocktail time featured black velvet basket weave brocade on the bodice, with matching velvet straps making a halter line on the shoulders. Petal detail gave a look of femininity to the neckline.

Navy piped buttons around the hipline and down the bodice emphasized the slender look of a pink linen frock.

In formal wear, pastel shades and ballerina lengths predominated. A coral tulle with a matching lace tunic extending into four points around the skirt and showing tiny tulle ruffles around the scoop neckline had a tailored, yet feminine look. Also an eye-catcher was a demure, yellow net frock featuring off-the-shoulder ruffles and a single deep ruffle around the hemline.


