The sincere sympathy of all North Torrance is extended to Stanley and Linda Jackson of 16926 Elgar, whose home was struck by tragedy Saturday. Thirteen-year-old Carolyn received

fatal injuries suffered when she fell down a 15-foot embankment during a week-end outing at Pomegranate Canyon near Corona. Carolyn was a member of Mrs. Boyd's eighth grade at North Torrance Elementary School and had been active in the Girl Scouts. Words are inadequate when a neighbor suffers the loss of a loved one, and tonight the kind thoughts of the entire area rise in unison to offer a small measure of comfort.

This Sunday a dinner and meeting will be held after church for the members and friends of the community church at McMaster's. All are urged to stay for this fellowship gathering.


