

Local Kiwanians Due for Big Time At NY Convention

Delegates of the Kiwanis Club of Torrance to the 38th annual convention of Kiwanis International at New York City, in June, will meet with over 15,000 fellow Kiwanians from every section of the United States, Canada, Alaska, and Hawaii, according to Club President Charles H. Ragsdale.

Outlining the program for the five-day convention, June 21-25, he said an exceptional panel of speakers and an elaborate program of entertainment await New York bound Kiwanians.

Such well-known personalities as Thomas E. Dewey, governor of the State of New York, Albany, New York; Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., United States representative to the United Nations, New York; Matthew Woll, vice-president of the American Federation of Labor, New York; George V. Denny, Jr., former moderator of the "American Town Meeting," New York; Dr. Ralph W. Sockman, pastor of Christ Church of New York; Frank G. Clement, governor of the State of Tennessee, Nashville, Tennessee; Grattan O'Leary, vice-president of the Ottawa Journal, Ottawa, Ontario; Kiwanis Past International President Bennett O. Knudson, president of radio station KATZ, Albert Lea, Minnesota; Vincent R. Impellitteri, mayor of the City of New York; and Herman W. Steinkraus, past president of the United States Chamber of Commerce and president of Bridgeport Brass Co., Bridgeport, Connecticut, will address sessions of the convention in New York's Madison Square Garden, the scene of many famous shows and sports events.

The majestic, towering spires of metropolitan New York will serve as a backdrop for the convention. Sightseeing tours of the wonders of "Gotham" have been planned which will enable guests to visit all sections of this historic city, now celebrating its tri-centennial. Tuesday afternoon and evening have been left free for this purpose.

One of the highlights at the convention will be the President's Reception and Ball Wednesday evening, June 24, honoring the 1952-53 president of Kiwanis International, Walter J. L. Ray of Detroit. One of the features of the ball will be a show directed by Leonidoff who produces the Radio City Music Hall stage extravaganza, Tuesday evening, June 23, will be known as "Kiwanis Night" at Yankee Stadium in New York where more than 10,000 Kiwanians will see an outstanding baseball game between the New York Yankees and the Chicago White Sox.

When Kiwanian husbands are in convention sessions, ladies and junior guests will be entertained by a variety of amusements, including a professional fashion show. Receptions, teas, and luncheons are still other attractions. Mrs. Ivy Baker Priest, Treasurer of the United States, will address one of the women's meetings.

Hundreds of Kiwanians will comprise the delegation from the California-Nevada-Hawaii District of this international community service organization. The Kiwanis Club of Torrance will announce its official convention delegates in the near future, President Ragsdale said.
