

New Stop Signs To Be Installed

Establishment of new boulevard stop regulations in the communities of Dominguez and Lomita has been recommended by the Los Angeles County Traffic Committee. It was disclosed this week by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The Committee urged installation of stop signs on each side of 223rd St. at all intersections from Moneta Ave. to and including Alameda St. with the exception of its intersection with Main St.

In order to properly control a cross conflict hazard at a high accident frequency intersection, the establishment of boulevard stops was recommended on each side of 250th St. at its intersection with Cypress in Lomita.

35 MPH Limit Set on Western

Establishment of a 35 mile per hour speed limit on Western Ave. between the Los Angeles City limits and a point three hundred feet north of Trudy Dr. was recommended this week, by the County Traffic Committee, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The recommendation followed a study made by County officials at the request of the Western View Homes Association. The Association's request for a speed reduction zone between Trudy Dr. and Channel Dr. was referred to the City of Los Angeles inasmuch as the area is within incorporated territory.

Chace Orders Action on Sewers for Milton St.

Chace's action was taken following report of the County Engineer and Surveyor when more than 60 per cent of the property owners in the area had petitioned for construction of the sewers.

Householder May Cancel Contract Under New Clause

Householders in County rubbish and garbage disposal districts Tuesday were given a legal whip which they may apply to contractors rendering unsatisfactory service.

County Supervisor Burton W. Chace was largely responsible for inclusion of a clause in the County's 15 new contracts which allows for cancellation upon the filing of petitions representing 15 per cent of householders who are dissatisfied with the service being rendered them.

The Board of Supervisors is calling for new bids in all existing disposal districts to be opened late this month. Also under consideration is the possible establishment of mobile transfer points consisting of large truck trailers which could be located at critical points during the week-ends and holidays.

They hope that persons who might otherwise promiscuously dispose of their rubbish along the roadways would take advantage of this service," Chace said.

Harbor Hospital Gets Large Cut Of County Money

A major expenditure of \$184,756.73 for capital improvements at Harbor General Hospital was part of the \$20,702,850 spent by the County of Los Angeles for capital construction and land acquisition during the past 22 months, it was reported this week by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Commenting on a report submitted to the Board of Supervisors Tuesday by the Chief Administrative Officer, Arthur J. Will, Chace said that report indicates "the great progress the County has made in improving service to the people."

Financing of the huge construction program for County buildings has been accomplished from four sources, according to Chace. The sources are: the County general fund, \$11,506,165; bond fund expenditure of \$7,418,880; accumulative capital outlay fund expenditures, \$1,692,569; and a branch library projects district fund \$17,035.

Among the major expenditures in the Fourth Supervisorial District represented by Chace, was the \$184,756.73 for capital improvements at the Harbor General Hospital. Another major expenditure for capital improvements was the sum of \$66,460.05 at Long Beach General Hospital. Also reported by Chace, was the amount spent was an item of \$67,695 for the South Bay Civic Center Building.

Capital improvements in court buildings in Santa Monica, Inglewood, and Compton amounted to \$75,713.54. According to Supervisor Chace, a total of almost \$150,000 was spent during the 22-month period by the County for land acquisition and major improvements on County beaches at Redondo, Manhattan Beach, Zuma Beach, El Porto Beach and Clifton County Beach.

Torrance School Children to Help In Clothes Drive

Almost 10,000 children of the Torrance Unified School District will be rummaging through their closets, attics, and through the bottom drawer of their dressers during the week of Dec. 7 through 11, according to Dr. J. H. Hull, Superintendent of the Torrance Unified School District.

These children will be helping in the Twelfth Annual Children's Clothing Crusade of the Save the Children Federation, joining hands with more than 200,000 school kids throughout California.

Last year, according to official figures, California's children brought in a total of 235,000 pounds of usable clothing for the children of the Navajo reservation, 161 counties in rural America, eight countries in Europe, the Near East and Korea. Dr. Hull stated that the statewide goal for this year is half a million pounds.

The Torrance Board of Education endorsed the program, pointing out both the humanitarian and the educational advantages to school kids here through assistance in this effort.

"Our children," stated Superintendent Hull, "learn something of the problems of others, through the classroom and teachers' aids provided by the Federation in this campaign, our children are taught and told of the suffering of war refugee children, and learn something, through helping, of the lives of foreign children."

LAW IN ACTION

RIGHT TO REPRESENTATION
Our trial courts are filled with drama. So, newspapers, radio, books, magazines, and TV play up drama, but often play down the pains we take to reach justice in our courts. A court will be an interesting place if you know who the "parties" are and what they do to get justice done. The elements in a court are the judge—he lays down the law; the jury—it settles the facts; the "plaintiff," and the "defendant."

The plaintiff in a civil action claims that somebody has violated his rights to his detriment. The "defendant" denies that he has done any legal harm to the plaintiff.

In a crime trial the plaintiff is "the people". They are represented by the district attorney. All criminal actions are titled: "The People of the State of California versus John Doe." Our Constitution holds that each party has a right to "counsel". You may have your lawyer present to guard your interests. You can tell him things in confidence. He will not—indeed, he cannot lawfully reveal them. This right to counsel is a basic right of all people appearing in our courts. When anybody infringes this right, our Supreme Court has reacted swiftly. A man or woman in trouble needs a "friend in court" of his own choice whom he can trust. A lawyer swears "to maintain inviolate the confidence, and at every peril to himself, to preserve the secrets of his client." He also swears "never to reject, for any consideration personal to himself, the cause of the defenseless or the oppressed."

Hence, a lawyer is duly bound to represent accused persons, even in the face of public wrath. The "guiltiest" person has a right to a fair trial. To get it, someone—a lawyer—must see that he has a fair jury, and that only lawful evidence is presented against him.

Women and girls are usually very attentive to the condition of their skin and rightly so. From time to time, they study their faces in the mirrors and view with alarm sometimes the wrinkles on the forehead, around the eyes, and at the corners of the mouth.

Select a good pore cream at your druggist's. Ask his advice if necessary and remember that it's best to pay a little more and get a better product. Well advertised products are usually safest in the long run.

When your face has been thoroughly cleaned with a mild soap and steamed by applying cloths wrung out of hot water or by holding one's face over a lavatory full of hot water, press out all the blackheads which will come out very easily. Be sure that your fingernails are absolutely clean and the skin is not bruised. Use sterilized absorbent cotton for this process.

Then, apply the pore cream. Try to plan so that you can leave it on your face at least two hours or better still.
