Celebration of Colorado River Aqueduct Week will be observed by the City of Torrance between Dec. 27, 1953 and Jan. 2, 1954, according to a proclamation issued this week by Mayor Mervin M. Schwab.

The mayor cited the importance of Colorado River water to the city and said the celebration would commemorate the organization of the Metropolitan Water District on Dec. 29, 1928, just 25 years ago. Torrance was one of the original 11 cities in the project.

No special plans to join in the celebration here have been announced.
