

Committee Kills Fluoridation of City Water Plan

There should be no fluoridation of water in Torrance within the next 10 to 12 years, a special committee of the Chamber of Commerce has decided.

Under the leadership of Fay Parks, the committee studied the pros and cons of adding fluorides to the city water supply to prevent tooth decay in children, and after several weeks of study, decided to oppose the fluoridation plan.

Committee spokesmen said that it would take 10 or 12 years to determine what the effects of fluoridation would be, and they said that they felt it would be unwise to test the method until more conclusive evidence is available.

Fluoridation is praised by some because it is supposed to prevent tooth decay in young children, but it is opposed by others who question its cumulative effects on the aged and on those who suffer from kidney ailments. The committee stated that it might be more feasible to continue fluoridation "in 10 to 12 years." Studies are presently being conducted in cities across the nation to determine the effects of fluoridation, and most of these studies will last for about 10 years before conclusive results emerge.

Also on the committee were Dr. Gerald Eastman and J. H. Paget.
