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## WASHINGTON NOTES

**GENERAL MARSHALL**  
General George C. Marshall, in Oslo, Norway, where he went to receive the Nobel Peace Prize, declared that college and schools had the duty to teach "our budding citizens" the exact nature of the causes that have led to a breakdown of world peace.

**ASIAN ALLIANCE**  
Although the United States has carefully avoided participation in any Asian regional agreements, it is encouraging the free nations of Asia to form an alliance among themselves to build up their defenses against any potential new Communist aggression.

**ARMY DRAFT**  
The Army draft next February will number 18,000 men, the smallest monthly total since June, 1952, according to an announcement by Secretary of Defense Charles A. Wilson. Since last July, monthly draft calls have been set at 23,000 men.

**STEEL PRODUCTION**  
Although steel production in November fell below the level of both the previous month and of November, 1952, the nation's output for the first eleven

months of this year set a new high record. The eleven-month production totaled 102,884,389 tons.

**DEFENSE CUT**  
A ten per cent cut in the armaments services has been ordered by the Defense Department, with the approval of President Eisenhower. The Army would be chiefly affected.

**COLLEGE STUDENTS**  
The 1953-54 enrollment reported by 1871 institutions of higher learning showed a total of 2,286,701 students, a 4.5 per cent rise over last fall. The increase in new students was 6.5 per cent.

**CREDIT UNIONS**  
Credit unions—cooperative associations founded to promote thrift and to supply loans for provident and productive purposes, continue to grow in the United States. At the end of 1952 there were 6382 under state charters, with a membership of 3,000,000 and assets of \$853,700,000, compared with 5881 having 2,700,000 members and assets of \$693,600,000 in 1951. There was a combined total of 12,000 state and federal chartered credit unions at the end of 1952 with almost 6,000,000 members and assets of \$1,500,000,000.

**1953 COTTON**  
A 16,437,000-bale cotton crop this year, which is 344,000 bales above the November estimate, has been forecast by the Agriculture Department.

**VET DIVIDEND**  
Nearly 5,000,000 World War II veterans will get another dividend on their GI insurance policies next year. Most of them will get a \$60 dividend. Payments will be started next February.

**Crosswalks for Dolores School OK'd by Board**  
Crosswalks with approach warning markings will be placed at the ten principal intersections in the area surrounding the Dolores St. School, Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced this week.

Chace said the Board of Supervisors at their Tuesday meeting approved approximately ten crosswalks and the painting of school warnings on the streets for the protection of pupils attending the school.
