er denied ever having been a member of the Nazis, Ku Klux Klan, or German-American Bund, but refused to affirm or deny past or present membership in the Communist Party.

Chason was discharged under the recently passed Dilworth Act which requires teachers to sign additional loyalty oaths after the Levering Oath. It is believed by Esterman that the constitutionality of the Dilworth Act will be tested when discharged teachers from the Los Angeles area take their cases before the Supreme Court. Esterman told the Herald that he is handling the cases of three teachers who will appeal to the Supreme Court to restore their jobs, taken away under the Dilworth Act.

If Chason fails to regain his teaching credentials, he will no longer be able to teach in the State of California.

## Local Firemen Heed 992 Calls in 1953

Torrance firemen responded to 992 emergency calls and chalked up a fire loss of \$81,788.16 for 1953, it was revealed in an annual report compiled for Chief J. J. Benner this week.

More than half of the year's fire loss, however, occurred in one afternoon: On June 17 when the United States Sulphur Co. plant burned down on 218th St. Loss there was set at \$45,808.50.

Grass and rubbish fires led with the largest number of causes during the year. There were a total of 237 such fires from Jan. 1, 1953, through Dec. 31, Benner said.

Eleven firemen were treated for injuries during the year, 10 of them as a result of the sulphur plant fire in June. The other injury came a month earlier when Capt. Bob Lucas was burned while at the scene of a fire on 233rd St.

May led the months in calls with 77. Of those calls, 62 were for grass or rubbish fires.

The fire loss for the year was only slightly higher than the 1952 total of \$81,119.68, the report showed.
