Clifton Blount and Harvey B. Spelman Jr.—the City Clerk's office, and the City Treasurer's office.

Only one of the four incumbents for those offices has entered the race officially. Mrs. Leech has filed petition for reelection.

Two of them, City Clerk Bartlett and Councilman Blount, have taken out petitions but have not indicated official that they will be in the race.  
The fourth, councilman Spelman, has said that he definitely will not be a candidate for any office here.

**Bonds on Ballot**  
In addition to the city officers at stake in the race, four bond issues totaling \$1,400,000 will be on the ballot.

No. 1 will call for bonds totaling \$200,000 for a swimming pool; No. 2 for \$700,000 for a new city hall, police station, and jail. No. 3 will ask for \$300,000 to construct a new central fire station and a new south Torrance station. No. 4 will be for \$150,000 for park development, construction of tennis courts, and ball diamonds.

Voters who plan to be out of the city on April 12 may get absentee ballots between March 24 and April 8.

## Doak Strike Off 'For Time Being'

Pickets who have paced up and down at the gates of Doak Aircraft on Western Ave. since the morning of Jan 13 pulled off the lines Thursday evening in an unannounced abandonment of the strike "for the time being."

One union worker told Herald yesterday that the order had come down to drop the walkout pending NLRB ruling on a new decertification election petition filed by the company last month.

Company officials said the first they knew that the strike was being called off was reports from the plant Thursday evening that trucks came out and picked up the furniture at the plant posts. Signs which the strikers had been carrying were piled up and burned.

The walkout was called earlier this year when about 27 members of Local 720-H of the International Association of Machinists struck to force negotiations for a new contract with the firm.  
A petition for a decertification election, filed by a plant leadman, was turned down by the NLRB on the grounds that leadmen were part of management, and not part of the union.  
Another petition was filed immediately by the company and it is expected to be sent to the NLRB in Washington about March 8. Hearings locally on the matter have been completed.


