

Police Out En Masse For Rites of Friend

The Torrance Police Department took time out Saturday afternoon to say goodbye to a friend—an elderly man who lived in seclusion in the Park Hotel who died Tuesday in his room after a long illness, and much pain.

The man, Sigizmund Soloway, a native of Poland, had only one relative, a niece in San Francisco—Mrs. A. T. Frietas. But he had many friends. Sgt. Bill Evans of the Police Department told the story much better than we can when he wrote the following eulogy, which he read to the police force at the change of shift Saturday afternoon, just before the funeral.

"This is what Sgt. Evans said: 'His name was Sigizmund Soloway, merely an ordinary, retiring person, intent on his personal affairs, with an intense desire to be friendly. In this effort, he was handicapped for he spoke our language with some difficulty, being of foreign extraction.

"He was a lonely man, having lived in Torrance for eight years or thereabouts, and made such friends and acquaintances as one does in the everyday contact of job, hotel and restaurants.

"For several years he had been afflicted with a malady that made life almost unbearable, suffering usually at

night with such pain as to be unable to sleep.

"On these nights he walked the streets for relief, and on these nightly vigils he became acquainted with and companion of those other night wanderers, the beat policemen.

"To these men he became a real friend—one known to these men who, by the very nature of their vocation, have become hardened to the hardships and sufferings of their fellow men. But to them the real man beneath the unpolished exterior quickly became apparent and he was accepted as one whose presence was not only welcome but desired.

"He became known to this new-found fraternity as 'Grumpy' not as one who bears that character, but because of his reticence, and he was delighted with the name that his friends had given him, in lieu of the racial 'Sigizmund' that had been his name from birth.

"Today 'Grumpy' is being buried, and to show their regard for this departed friend the members of the Police Department are turning out en masse, as a gesture of their appreciation of the comradeship of this fellow man, who asked nothing more than the companionship of another during those hours of suffering and loneliness that he endured so patiently and uncomplainingly.

"Six motor officers will ride motor escort, while six others bear the coffin that carries the last earthly remains of their former friend.

"And as these friends file past the bier for the last look at 'Grumpy' there will seem to be a ghost of a smile on the lips; and as the little cortege winds slowly toward the final resting place, if it were given to him to feel, I believe that he would rather that those who view and wonder whose procession it might be would think of it as a parade rather than a funeral, for another friend who, beyond the call of duty, have turned aside from the toils and the care of the day and have paused to do a kindly act for a friend whose body is being returned to the earth and soul to its maker.

"May he rest in peace."

Planners Deny Church Request For Variance

A variance sought for construction of a church and Sunday School on 171st St. between Yukon Ave. and Prairie was recommended for denial at this week's meeting of the city Planning Commission.

The variance had been petitioned by Richard Mann for a church to be located in a single family residential zone. The petition had been protested before the planners and before the City Council by a number of residents of the area.

Also recommended for denial by the planners was a petition for variance sought by Richard Sherman for location of a service station in a multiple-family dwellings zone on 174th St. near Prairie Ave.

Petitions of property owners facing Torrance Blvd. between Madrid Ave. and Crenshaw requesting zoning of the area for retail commercial use were heard by the planners in the first of two scheduled hearings on the matter.

Attorney Donald Armstrong, representing the petitioners, explained the position of a majority of owners in the area, citing census figures on the city's growth in a plea for approval of the request.
