Prepare Garden Now for May Flower Show Blooms

Many of our local residents will be wanting their pet flower or plant to have specimen blooms and lush foliage in time for the annual Hobby, Arts, and Flower Show, May 21, 22, and 23. Many plants and flowers are not in full bloom at this date. The North Torrance Branch of the California Fuchsia Society and the Torrance Terrace Garden Club have compiled a few hints and pointers which might be tried in order to force early growth and blooms.

GROOM FUCHSIAS NOW

Grooming must begin early for fuchsias. Fuchsias should be pruned now. After pruning, be sure to protect from frost. Try covering with newspapers at night, but be sure to remove paper in the morning.

On these cold days, keep moving your potted fuchsias with the sun and on dark and rainy days move them to a warm and light spot. Water them every day with a light spray.

For your feeding and fungicide care, a systematic program is best. It is better to use a weak solution of both more often than a strong solution at long intervals. Spray every 10 days and feed with acid-type fertilizer about every two weeks. Never feed or spray when your plant is dry.

FEED GLADIUS

For gladiolus, you might try feeding liquid fish fertilizer just after the foliage breaks through the ground and a light application every two weeks until the bloom begins to form. A little bone meal worked in around the bulb will help. Dust for the tip often, as thrips are gladiolus' worst enemy.

For roses, cut back about 2/3 of last year's growth about the middle of February. Feed a good commercial fertilizer about six weeks before you want blooms. Work a handful of blood meal around the base of each bush.

Hibiscus can be treated about the same as roses. When pruning, cut ends pointing inward. Spray both roses and hibiscus regularly for aphids.

IRIS NEED BONE MEAL

It is one of our loveliest spring flowers. Use a handful of bone meal and work in around the base of each plant. Do not use manure for fertilizer as it is inclined to rot the rhizomes. Try a light feeding at weekly intervals of liquid fish fertilizer. It works wonders. Do not overwater; Iris prefers soil on the dry side.

Start a few tuberous begonias now and a few about the first of March in a bed of peat moss. When they are ready to be potted, use two tablespoons of fish meal in the bottom of each pot mixed with one tablespoonful of bone meal. Remove side shoots, except one, for large specimen blooms. Be sure to keep moist but not soggy.

May is the best month for epiphyllums. Fertilize well with a liquid type fertilizer the latter part of February or early March and give a second application when the buds are set about two inches long. Water plants well before applying fertilizer.

SHADE PLANTS

For the shade-loving plants, it is best to feed a regular light feeding of a liquid form, and the plants should receive a light water spray once a day like fuchsias.

For the annual and perennial flowers, an extra feeding of a liquid fertilizer will be helpful in producing blooms. On carnations, shastas, etc., be sure to
