

Vote for Classrooms Tuesday

An editorial published here on Feb. 21, 1952, drew attention to the fact that carpenters can build houses faster than they can build schools.

During the two years since that time, this logic has been demonstrated with force—the city has seen the construction of about 4000 homes since that time, and the population of the city has risen from 31,000 to 45,000.

Largest impact of such explosive population gains is in the city's mushrooming school system, which has grown from four elementary schools in 1947 to 14 today.

Up to the voters of Torrance next Tuesday is a bond issue for \$3,000,000 to be used to further expand the schools to meet demands for classrooms.

The bond issue was endorsed without hesitation by the Torrance Industries Tax Committee, whose members represent the major source of revenue for the city.

Cost of the bond issue will be negligible to the average homeowner, but will build classrooms for the pupils now on double session—and go a long way toward helping the schools meet demands for classrooms in the

immediate future. One school official explained the measure as "part of the process of Torrance becoming a city of 100,000 population."

Money obtained by passage of the bond issue "Tuesday" will be used for construction and rehabilitation of elementary school facilities. Money for the new North Torrance High School is on hand, drawing interest for the district until such a time as construction is started.

Federal funds have built much of the city's new school facilities, and more is expected this year. However, the Federal funds will not be sufficient to build the number of classrooms needed to meet demands of the increasing population of Torrance.

We think no one can deny that the money spent by the Torrance Unified School District during the seven years of its existence has been stretched far beyond that of other districts with which it could be compared. The taxpayer is getting his money's worth in schools here, and he will continue to do so with the \$3,000,000.

The Herald recommends that you go to the polls Tuesday, and that you vote "Yes."

Theme of 'Prayer Day' Told

"Go Ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every nation" is the Bible quotation chosen as the theme of "World Day of Prayer" tomorrow for Torrance. Mrs. Paul Wenske, wife of the Pastor of the Lutheran Church, said this week.

Luke 8:16-19 has been chosen as the portion of the Bible to be read by those who want to participate in the worldwide prayer, Mrs. Wenske said.

"This passage pertains to all walks of life—to housewives as well as those on a payroll," the Pastor's wife said. She continued, "it can also be used as a demonstration story for children by using a candle and showing that by covering it, the light cannot be seen. Thus, as members of God's creation, we

are covering up God's light within us when we do not show God in our thoughts, words and deeds among people.

"People in wheel chairs or those who are bedfast have been known to show such great light that their lives have been a great inspiration to the world.

"Everyone in Torrance is asked to read this portion of the Bible tomorrow and pray, preferably with those near him. It is also desired that every family will gather together for family devotion on this day. The 'World Day of Prayer' committee hopes that this plan for 'A Praying Torrance' might provoke various opinions for next year's planning, so that it can be more effective in the future," Mrs. Wenske concluded.

Postal Employees Respond

In response to a story detailing Postmaster General Summerfield's recommendations for postal employees' salaries carried in the Torrance Herald last week, the local employees yesterday labeled the proposals as unworkable and unfair.

President Ernest Hobbs, of the National Association of Letter Carriers Local 2207 and Edward Sledel, of the National Federation of Post Office Clerks Local 1043, said the proposed increases are far below pay changes asked for by the two organizations. Both union officials said their proposals had been worked out carefully with full consideration of the welfare of both the taxpayers and the postal employees.

Summerfield's proposal would increase salary ranges from \$10 to \$210 annually. Although

only one employee in the Torrance Post Office would receive the \$10 a year increase, none would get the \$210 maximum, it was pointed out.

Eleven employees would get a raise of \$25 a year (\$1.04 each payday) and another 11 would get an annual raise of \$100, according to local sources.

The present basic annual salary pay scales range from \$3270 to \$4070 and the employees' organization is backing passage of the Rhodes-Withrow Bill, H.R. 2344, which would give postal employees an \$800 blanket increase.

We agree with the employees' contention that it is important to make postal jobs attractive enough to help keep good men and women on the job.

COMMUNIST VICTORY AT BERLIN

The Foreign Ministers Conference in East-West Berlin was a colossal failure in reaching any solution to the problems for which it was originally planned. Those problems were: peace-treaties for Germany and Austria. Some commentators suggest that progress was made toward the achievement of peace. One columnist compared the Conference to a half-back running the ball 50 yards down the field. Is it failure, he suggests, because he did not score a touchdown? This implies that we made considerable progress toward peace in Berlin. At this moment the only apparent progress made was to learn that Malenkov is more ruthless than Stalin, and Molotov is outpunching Vishinsky in his deceit. But instead of gaining 50 yards toward an honorable solution, we suffered a costly loss by agreeing to permit Red China to the coming Asian Peace Conference in Geneva on April 26. Equally worse was Mr. Dulles' approval to allow Russia to participate in this conference on Korea as a belligerent. For weeks in the UN General Assembly Henry Cabot Lodge debated and won his point that Russia be seated as a co-belligerent with North Korea and Red China in any discussion of a Korean truce. Dulles' reversal of this position in Berlin was a victory Russia could not obtain in New York.

U. S. Pays and Pays

Since 1945 the U. S. has poured its blood and billions to prevent Communist enslavement in Europe and Asia. We sacrificed over 250,000 of our manhood in Korea, not to mention the living death of thousands more in Veteran's Hospitals. We poured over 20 billions already in Korea. We gave Britain some 16 billion, France over 12 billion and Italy 6 billion, since 1945. Italy is on the verge of Communism (37 per cent Communist today) and Communist support in France has almost doubled since 1945 (25 per cent today). There is more anti-American sentiment in Britain today than at any time since 1945. If the British press were to be taken as a criterion of this sentiment on the Island, after so much sacrifice, the coming Asia Peace Conference is going to find the U. S. defending a Italy 6 billion, since 1945. Italy is on the verge of Communism (37 per cent Communist today) and Communist support in France has almost doubled since 1945 (25 per cent today). 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
