"June in January" Theme of ECC International Flower Show Entry
"It's June in January," with minor revisions, describes El Camino College's entry, now on display at the International Flower Show.
"One of the interesting factors about our display," Charles Luger, El Camino horticulture instructor comments, "is the fact that it utilizes out-of-season plants. We are displaying summer flowers in winter."
A part of the educational display which won one of the six major awards at the show, the El Camino exhibit features a Mexican garden of annuals. Theme of the entire educational exhibit is "Old Mexico."
Annals used by the local college include coral bells, dwarf dahlias, zinnias, cosmos, marigolds, and ageratum. Adding to the colorful display is the use of native cacti. All together, the exhibit consists of 10,000 flowering plants which were, according to Luger, brought to the flowering stage in the college greenhouses in a 67-day "whirlwind attempt" to meet the display time limits.
Shrine Local Point
In contrast to the colorful flowers appearing in the El Camino entry is the adobe brick shrine, a focal point of the garden. Plant and other materials used to complete the educational project were prepared on a budget of \$200, Luger explained. He added that the local display was featured on a recent TV program for a three-minute period.

Tickets, at \$1.50 for adults, and 50 cents for children, can be obtained at the PV Drug Store.


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High Schools Invited To El Camino Press Day Activities

Students representing eight high schools—including Torrance—have been invited to participate in Press Day activities on the campus of El Camino College Friday.
Highlighting the day's activities will be a Writers' tournament in which the 60 high school journalism students attending will compete. Four divisions of writing will be open—news, sports, editorial, and feature. Awards will be made to the top three writers in each division, according to Judy Applebaum of Hawthorne, Press day chairman.
Preliminary to the tournament will be four seminars conducted by representatives of the Los Angeles press. Leading a discussion on feature writing will be Ray Parker of the Los Angeles Times. Ira Walsh, representing the Los Angeles Examiner, will speak to students interested in the sports field. John Grover of the Mirror editorial staff will speak to editorial writers, while Winnie Hendricks of the Christian Science Monitor and Lisle Schmahner, as assistant to the publisher of the Los Angeles Daily News will address news writers.

Delinquency To Be Topic At Meeting

Twenty-five public and private organizations and the health and youth agencies of the Community Chest participate in this conference and carry through on the recommendations.
Hundreds of delegates from churches, PTAs, service clubs and public and private social agencies from all cities in Southern California will attend.
