


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Half of Population Has Had Chickenpox

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chickenpox over with at the present time. More than 7000 cases have been reported since the first of the year.

The incubation period for chickenpox is two or three weeks. The usual symptoms, are mild chill, vomiting, and aching of the back and legs. About 24 hours later, the skin breaks out in small raised pink spots which change into blisters. The lesions are abundant on the scalp, usually are present inside the mouth, and occur in greater density on the trunk of the body than on the arms and legs. These blisters quickly form crusts which fall off in the course of two or three weeks. The pink spots, blisters, and crusts usually appear in successive crops, and it is common to see all three stages of development at the same time.

Spread By Discharge

The disease is spread from the virus which is present in the blisters and also in discharges from the nose and throat especially during the day or two preceding the rash and in the first few days of the eruption. Chickenpox is extremely contagious, but in most cases isn't very serious. Complications are few and the death rate is negligible. However, adults are especially prone to develop a complicating pneumonia which may be fatal unless prompt and competent medical attention is available.

Even though chickenpox is usually mild, parents are reminded that reasonable precautions should be observed. First of all only a physician should be entrusted to differentiate between a severe case of chickenpox and a mild case of smallpox.

Should Prevent Chilling

Although a child may not be very sick with chickenpox, care should be exercised to prevent chilling or fatigue. Severe itching and the consequent desire of the child to scratch off the crusts has caused permanent scarring and, in some cases, secondary infection of the skin. Application of a soothing lotion or ointment can help to allay itching. In very young children, it is sometimes necessary to use elbow splints or arm restraints.

California law requires that all cases of chickenpox be reported to the health department. Control measures require that a case of chickenpox be isolated for a minimum of 7 days after the appearance of the eruption and, until primary crusts have disappeared, from exposed parts of the body. No quarantine measures apply to the family or others.

Taxation of Property.

I believe we have just about reached the limit of taxation on any kind of property and now should concentrate on eliminating duplication of government services, doing away with overlapping government functions, abolishing useless jobs and generally exercising the economy and efficiency which should prevail in a private business.

Who Pays Taxes?

I agree with her about reducing taxes but the idea that we can get all the money needed by the government by "soaking the rich" is foolish for the simple reason that in any business or industry taxes are part of the cost of doing business and are added to the cost of production, thereby passed on to the consumer, which happens to be you and me. When I explained this to the lady in Westchester, she replied: "If a manufacturer tried to pass on his taxes to those buying his product, I think the government should forbid such action." The answer to that idea is that people go into the ownership of business and industry to make a profit. In order to make a profit they must sell the goods for more than it costs to produce them. Any other philosophy leads to socialism which is the younger sister of Communism.

More School Teachers

A young man in Playa del Rey, which is a beautiful little community beside the sea, has written that he wants "more schools, teachers and playgrounds." I agree with him 100 per cent. That is just exactly what I have been working for during the nearly four years that I have been in public office and for years before I even thought about running for public office.
