

HARBOR NURSES ATTEND NATIONAL CONVENTION

More than 250 California professional registered nurses this week are enroute to the 1954 Convention of the American Nurses Association which opens in Chicago tomorrow, according to Helen Scott, president of the Harbor Area Nurses Association.

The official party of delegates from the Harbor area will leave by plane this weekend. Among the local nurses making the trip are Mrs. Scott of Lomita and Mary K. Stanley of Long Beach. They will reside at the Congress Hotel during the five-day convention in the Windy City.

The estimated 7000 nurse delegates, visitors, and students expected at the meet will be representing the 177,000 professional nurse members of the ANA in the 48 states, the District of Columbia, and the territories of Alaska, Hawaii, Puerto

Rico, and the Canal Zone. California's official party will comprise one of the largest of the state delegations in attendance. Based on membership in the California State Nurses Association, third largest in the United States, and on the membership of its seven occupational nursing sections, the CSNA will be represented by 48 delegates or their alternates and three delegates at large.

California nurses also will play an important role in the convention program. Miss Shirley C. Titus, executive director of the CSNA, will participate as one of the four panel members in a discussion of "How the Sections Function" before the Institutional Nursing Service Administrators section on Tuesday afternoon. Miss Evelyn M. Hamill of Rancho Los Amigos, chairman of the INSA section, will preside at the meeting.

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
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
