Leuzinger Jumper Wins Finals, Gives Medal to Injured Tartar Larry Morgan

Winning a first place medal in the league track finals is the dream of most high school track men and, once acquired, these baubles are coveted and caressed through the years. But at the Bay League track finals Friday, a young Leuzinger athlete set an example of rare sportsmanship. He gave his first place medal away. The youth Broad Jumper Jack Stephens, won first place in the finals with a tremendous leap of 21 ft. 3 3/4 in, then gave his first place medal to Torrance Broad Jumper Larry Morgan, who has been out with a back injury this year and unable to compete. Stephens said that he was giving Morgan the medal because he felt sorry that his old rival couldn't compete this year and said he thought Morgan could have won the jump event. Last year, the two jumpers engaged in a tremendous battle in
