A TRIP AROUND THE HARBOR. Last Tuesday I went with a group from the various service clubs on a trip around the harbor. We left the Matson Liner Docks at 12 o'clock and covered all of the Los Angeles Harbor Area and also the Long Beach Harbor Area. We enjoyed a very fine box lunch while aboard and saw many interesting things.

There are 40 miles of wharves in the port area and we saw the docks where bananas are unloaded—200,000-600 pounds of bananas are unloaded there each year. We also saw the oil tanker "Margaret Onstead," which holds 150,000 barrels of oil. This is just an average size tanker today. In the early part of the century, 50,000 barrels about a capacity load; today they hold up to as high as 350,000 barrels.

There were 3 fire boats in the area—really floating fire wagons. We also saw Catalina Terminal where 600,000 tons of freight are shipped each year to Catalina Island—everything from horses to televisions. We smelled the fish dock (I mean saw the fish dock) where hundreds of tons of fresh fish are cleaned and gotten ready for delivery to retail outlets.

The outer breakwater is 9 miles long, running from San Pedro to Seal Beach. In some places it cost as much as \$1,000,000 per foot to build it! This trip is open to the public, for \$2. Telephone Terminal 4-0959 for reservations—it's worth it.

Sunday is "Harbor Day." The Matson Lines are holding open house and they will have the fabulous "Lurline" there, open to the public, from 12:30 to 4 P.M. To get there, go to the end of Avalon Boulevard and turn left two blocks. Also free water taxi rides.

Churchman Bound For Hong Kong

The Rev. J. Russell Killman, former assistant pastor of the First Baptist Church, will leave for Hong Kong with his family soon for four years under the Bible Institute of Los Angeles.

A farewell service will be held Wednesday, May 26, at 7:30 p.m. at the church. The Rev. Killman will present a message on missions and will show a film on Hong Kong entitled "Gateway to Asia."

If time permits, the Rev. Killman will show films of the signing of the truce at Panmunjom, which he covered as a newsman-cinematographer.

The film, "Gateway to Asia," produced by the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, gives the latest account of missionary work in Hong Kong, the only remaining territory on the mainland of China where Christianity may be freely proclaimed, according to Killman. With the continued advances of communism in the Orient, this century-old British colony has become a strategic point in Far Eastern affairs, he states.
