Torrance Student Featured in Ballet

Carol Ann Armstrong, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. LeRoy J. Armstrong, 1633 Juniper Ave., will star in Marymount of Palos Verdes Second Annual Mid-May Festival, school officials announced today. The Festival, to be staged both Saturday and Sunday, May 22 and 23 at the school, will also feature Miss Ann Eaton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Eaton, 1744 Palos Verdes Dr. West, Palos Verdes Estates, and Miss Mary Ann Desmond, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Desmond, 1501 Chelsea, Palos Verdes Estates. Marymount officials added that this annual Mid-May presentation, titled "Spotlight, U. S. A.," is the second to be staged and a continuation of a regular Mid-May tradition at the school. All 175 students will be represented in the giant festival with Misses Armstrong, Eaton and Desmond featured. In the giant ballet, the continuity takes the form of a travelogue from the east coast of the United States, south and then west across the continent to a finale in Southern California. States represented by ballet skits include New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, Missouri, Oklahoma,

Alabama steps up for acclaim with the "Jeminas-Alabama-Bound" number done by the ninth grade girls. Then westward moves the staging, to Missouri for the "St. Louis Belles," number by the fourth and fifth grade girls. The Oklahoma ballet follows with "Ozark Ramblers," done by the second and third grade girls, followed by "On the Range," a Texas salute by the fourth grade boys. The seventh grade boys follow with the New Mexican number "Indian Dance." Arizona comes next with the sixth grade girls executing "Desert Flowers," whereupon the ballet moves into its climax with California's two numbers. The Marymount Alma Mater follows the finale. Dancing is under the supervision of the Stover-Lane Studios of Redondo Beach. Because of the anticipated large numbers of relatives and friends attending, three performances have been scheduled, two Saturday afternoon and one Sunday afternoon, school officials concluded.
