Graduating this month from Long Beach State College will be five residents of Torrance while one will be receiving the degree of Master of Arts from the college. More than 350 in all will graduate with bachelor's degree from the college and approximately 146 will receive their master's degree.

Graduates from Torrance are Emily Stanton Young, Carol B. Clark, Marie D. Bunch, Donald A. Logue, Phyllis Patricia Clere, and the candidate for Master of Arts is Virginia F. Wilson.

Graduation exercises will be held June 19, 1953, at 8 p.m. in the Long Beach City College gymnasium on Carson St. in Lakewood. Last year approximately 3500 persons crowded the same building to see 352 bachelor's degrees and 87 Master's degrees awarded.

Long Beach State College was founded in 1949 and is located in temporary quarters on its 320 acre site at 7th St. and Bellflower in Long Beach. On Wednesday, March 20, ground-breaking ceremonies were held for the start of construction of more than \$5,000,000 worth of new buildings. More than 2500 students are enrolled in the college, which will accept freshmen and sophomores next September for the first time. Previous to this the college has only offered work for the graduate, for the senior and the junior student.

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
