Among the 14 members of the Vocational Nursing Course at Harbor Junior College are two residents of Torrance and two from Lomita who will be capped during the commencement exercises of the S'53 graduating class to be held on Thursday evening, June 18, Raymond J. Casey, tech. director, announced at this week.

The traditional capping of the nurses signifies their entrance into practical training at Harbor General Hospital, which is jointly with the college sponsors the one-year vocational nurses training program.

Students enrolled in the vocational nursing training program spend 20 weeks on the Harbor Tech campus taking required academic courses, are then capped, and receive 32 weeks of practical training at Harbor General Hospital with pay, Casey indicated.

"These classes will give the women of Torrance and vicinity the opportunity to take advantage of instruction, given with charge, in mass feeding as well as assist homemakers in preparing meals at home," Mrs. Stoddard disclosed.

Similar classes have been staged in Los Angeles chapter communities and Red Cross to date has received several calls for repeat performances.

"Women attending will receive recipe books devoted to menus advantageous to mass feeding and also will be presented with cook books for home use," Mrs. Stoddard said.
