


THS Teeners Hold All-Night Fun Fest

FRIENDSHIP ACROSS THE SEA Philippine Girl Scouts Send Gifts To Local Troop 1299

Hand-made baskets and purses came all the way to Torrance from the Philippines this week, another link in the chain of international friendship joining local Girl Scouts with their island sisters.

The gifts, received by Girl Scouts of Fern Ave.-Greenwood PTA-sponsored Troop No. 1299, were sent by Besom Troop No. 4, Negros Oriental, Philippines, as a thank-you for the home-dressed, story-book dolls the local girls sent to the islands at Easter.

Received with the package was a letter sent by Mrs. Flor Garcia, leader of the Philippine troop, to Mrs. A. Krauszer, Torrance leader.

"You would surely imagine the faces of my girls when the boxes of dolls arrived here on Apr. 7," Mrs. Garcia wrote.

"Everyone who received their dolls jumped with great delight. The wonderful gifts you sent us had given joy not only to the Girl Scouts, but also to their parents when they saw them. They learned to appreciate the spirit of Scouting. Those rare gifts received by the girls had the envy of all the others. Not one of these girls had the opportunity of possessing such dolls before. My happiness and the happiness of the girls could not be expressed in words. We really appreciate your kind thought for us. We are all thankful for them."

"On a separate package the girls once more are sending to your girls different articles they have made themselves. They are not well done, I suppose, but they mean something of their love for their friends."

"The packages you sent us did not incur any amount for custom duties. Since they were gifts and came from the Girl Scouts, nothing was paid for."

"My girls might be writing to you girls directly. Some of them are very poor in their grammar and could not express their thoughts well enough. I hope your girls will understand. You know English is not our language. The children use them only when they are in the classrooms and when they read books and magazines, but not all children are good readers. Some does not care to read. I'm even defective too in my written, as well as spoken English. I hope I can learn better by my continued writing to friends abroad."
