NEW FAMILY RELATIONS CLASS STARTS TUESDAY

"Adventuring in parent-child relationships" will be the subject of a seven-lecture course to be sponsored by the Compton Counseling Service beginning next Tuesday, July 14.

Each of the seven lectures will be held on Tuesday at 8 p.m. at the Service, 408 N. Compton. Aim of the series, according to Dr. Ruth P. Koshuk, director, will be to "explore the field of family relationships, so vitally important for wholesome personality development."

"It is in the family that children gain their first experiences of love, affection, and cooperation," Dr. Koshuk said. "A child without the warm security of such a 'home base' with no strong sense of belonging as a family member enters the larger world unprepared. He may develop many forms of problem behavior."

"On the other hand, many new ways of shared living found in modern homes greatly enrich life's experiences and integrate family life."

Dr. Koshuk, a former director of child care centers in Bellflower public schools, has been a counselor at the Child Counseling Center in Sewickley Valley, Penn., since February, 1952. She also has taught extension courses in child development and family living under the University of Southern California and the University of California at Los Angeles.

Parents, including fathers, are especially urged to enroll in Dr. Koshuk's class. The course, however, is open to anyone whose concern, interest, or work is with children.

Here's How! Arrive At Vacation Spot With Well-groomed Look; Pack Garments Carefully

Men and women alike spend countless hours poring over maps and travel folders, and go to untold effort and expense to select well-balanced wardrobes for their annual rest, recreation, and relaxation periods.

With the coming of the warm weather sun, most people begin to dream and plan for vacation time.

But they often spend too little time packing those wardrobes, forgetting the importance of proper packing to their appearances. Because they pack carelessly or ineptly, they either fail to look neat and well-groomed or spend needless time and money in taking care of their clothes.

Experienced travelers, however, have found that a few simple steps followed in packing make the job of looking neater far easier.

Seasoned packers make a check-list of everything needed, thus avoiding the cramming of last-minute items into the bag, which often causes wrinkling or soiling of carefully-packed clothing. And because they make certain that all clothing is clean, well pressed, and in good condition before it is packed, they seldom find it necessary to carry a traveling iron or use cleaning and valet services, even on extended trips.

In choosing luggage, men generally find the "two-suiters" most convenient; women, the Pullman bag or fitted wardrobe case.

To pack the two-suiters, open it on a bed or luggage rack and remove the hangers. In the hanger section, first place trousers, with the waistline of each pair against one end of the case, and legs hanging neatly over the other. Alternate the direction in which each succeeding pair of trousers is placed in the case.

Next, put suit-coats and sports jackets on the hangers provided in the case, padding shoulders where necessary with tissue paper. Lay them flat in the compartment — with bottoms hanging over the edge of the case. Roll the sleeves of each coat around the outer edges of the garment, and smooth out all wrinkles. Next, fold coat bottoms into the case, locking them in place in bags which have dividers, and again smooth out wrinkles.

At this point, fold trousers neatly into the case, one pair at a time. When the trousers are in place and all wrinkles are smoothed out, fasten the belt or curtain which closes this section of the two-suiters.

In packing the second section of the bag, place heavy objects such as shoes, so that they will be at the bottom of the case and lighter furnishings such as socks, ties, shirts, and underwear near the top.

Because of its size, the simple Pullman bag is ideal for packing women's skirts and suit jackets. Jackets may be laid flat in the bottom of the case and unbuttoned so that skirts may be placed inside.


When the top section of the skirt has been neatly flattened inside the jacket, the latter is buttoned and all wrinkles are smoothed out. Before folding the lower portion of the skirt into the bag, the wise woman places a sweater, swimsuit, or other soft object, thus preventing a horizontal crease from developing in the skirt.

In packing dresses, the smart girl places liberal quantities of tissue in the shoulders, then lays the top portion of the dress in the case and smooths it out. Before folding in lower sections of the dress, she places a cushioning layer of apparel on the top portion.

When it comes to packing a fitted wardrobe case, the same procedure is followed as in packing men's suits in a two-suiters, except that suit skirts are hung neatly on hangers and placed inside suit jackets. A considerable amount of tissue is required, however, to protect the jackets.

Bottoms of jackets and lower sections of skirts are allowed to hang over the front of the case, then are neatly folded in. Sweaters and other apparel are used to fill out the hanger section of the case.

Last and one of the most important tips for both men and women packers is to avoid crushing and over-crowding clothes. To reduce the effects of packing, keep garments in the suitcase for as little time as possible, and leave the case open after packing until departure.
