**RECIPE**  
**FRICASSEE CHICKEN WITH BISCUITS**  
1 Fricassee chicken, 3 peppercorns, tip of  
3 pounds, cut up bay leaf  
2 cups of water 5 tablespoons chicken fat  
2 teaspoons salt 8 tablespoons flour  
1 medium onion 1 cup milk  
3 cups chicken broth, salt, pepper  
Simmer chicken, giblets and neck in water with salt, onion, peppercorns and bay leaf until tender, about 2 hours. Remove chicken from broth and set aside to keep hot while preparing gravy. Spoon fat from surface of broth. Add enough water to broth to make 3 cups. Blend 5 tablespoons chicken fat, 1/2 cup flour and 1 cup milk, stirring constantly until uniformly thick. Cover and simmer about 5 minutes. Season to taste. Remove chicken to gravy to heat. Serve hot with 4-1 biscuits placed atop gravy and meat.
