National Supply Rig Sets New Well Mark

The world's record for deep well drilling for crude oil was broken at the Ohio Oil Co. wildcat well in the Paloma Field, 25 miles southwest of Bakersfield, Aug. 20, 1953.

Using the same Ideal Type 125 Rig that broke the depth record for Michigan in 1948, a company crew has drilled beyond the world's record depth, 20,521 feet, established in 1949. Drilling continued and might eventually go to about 21,000 feet, it was indicated.

Many of the components of the record rig were manufactured at the Torrance plant of National Supply, officials said.

The previous depth record was established by the Superior Oil Co. at Rock Springs, Wyo., using an Ideal Type 160 rig. Both rigs were made by the National Supply Co.

The California wildcat, nearly four miles deep, is being drilled in search of oil and gas production below the present producing depths in the Paloma Field. Much of the drilling was with diamond bits, both regular and coring, which made it possible to remove solid cores of the geological formations at various depths. Hundreds of these cores have been brought to the

Miller said yesterday members offered their services to help prevent suffocation of children playing in discarded boxes. He asked the public to phone FAIRfax 8-1961.


