Pair Nabbed for Theft of Checks From Local Firm

In trouble again with Torrance police is 22-year-old Fred C. Tilden, who vaulted the counter and jammed out of the police station here in November, 1950, when he was picked up for questioning on operation of a forgery-dope ring in the area.

Tilden was arrested by Detective Captain Ernie Ashton and Sgt. D. C. Cook Tuesday after a 17-year-old suspect put the finger on him for the Torrance Sand and Gravel Co. burglary last week.

Recovered by Torrance police from the 17-year-old was a large company check book which had been taken along with a typewriter and a Skill Drill in the burglary.

Tilden allegedly admitted his implication in the burglary to detectives here Tuesday. He was arraigned in South Bay Municipal Court yesterday.

Tilden, who gave his address as 14851 Marigold Ave., Gardena, is married and has three children, the youngest only two weeks old.

Captured Later

It was on Nov. 25, 1950 that Tilden was picked up here by Torrance police in a chain of arrests which followed the wrecking of a \$17,000 custom-built Packard convertible on Pacific Coast Hwy. While being booked at Torrance jail, he vaulted the counter and was captured six hours later by Police Officers Don Hamilton, A. L. Jackson, and Gale Whitacre in his trailer home.

Since that time, Torrance police say, he has apparently "gone straight" and stayed out of trouble. He had been working for a Gardena glass company.

Three Million Dollar Month Recorded Here

Torrance building valuations for 1953 moved toward that magical \$20,000,000 mark in August as the year's total permit valuations rose to \$30,448,033.

Contributing to the record-shattering total for the year was the August total of \$3,043,435, one of the highest months recorded here.

A year ago permits issued in August amounted only to \$815,962. Total permits at this time last year were \$12,932,216, or more than \$6 million short of this year's pace.

September started off with a surge Tuesday when the building department issued 60 permits to the Victoria Enterprise tract at a total permit valuation of more than \$500,000.
