Co-op Nursery In September One Year Old

Tuesday, Sept. 15, will mark the first year anniversary of Torrance Co-operative Nursery School.

Under the school's program, sponsored by the Torrance Adult Education Department, 25 parents meet each Monday at the high school to discuss the proper guidance of their children and to hear lectures by recognized authorities. The nursery school acts as a laboratory supplement to the course, with six different mothers assisting the director each morning; 9 a.m. to 12 noon.

Monday through Thursday. Here they put into practice what they have learned in the evening sessions.

Educators believe that preschool experience gives children from two and a half to five a head start in learning how to act independently outside the home.

The tots learn to play with contemporaries at the same age level instead of in competition with older siblings and neighborhood children. They learn to share, take turns, co-operate and consider the rights of others, all of which make adjustment to elementary school easier.
