



CONFUSION of CREATION

Sight of Eiffel Tower Breathtaking, Miss Barbara Kiefer Writes from Paris

"It was breathtaking, and I was so excited I could have cried," Miss Barbara Kiefer, daughter of the C. E. Kiefers, 2280 Torrance Blvd., wrote of her first sight in Paris, the spire of the Eiffel Tower and the domes and minarets of the Sacre-Coeur, atop Montmartre.

Miss Kiefer, civil service with the U. S. Army at The Hague, in the Netherlands, visited Paris on a recent five-day holiday.

"Life seems to begin in Paris at 8:30 or 9 o'clock at night," she writes, "so after we got settled at the hotel and had some supper we took off on a bus tour of the city. Around midnight we stopped at the grand Cafe de la Paix on the Boulevard des Capucines to watch the gay world of Paris pass in review.

"I was awakened bright and early next morning by the arrival of the famous French breakfast, cafe au lait and croissants, to my room. Seems the French prefer you to breakfast!

"We then visited the Pantheon which, during the Revolution, became the burying place for such famous personages as Voltaire, Rousseau, Victor Hugo. The architecture is lovely — all ornate and resplendent.

"We went to the Hotel des Invalides, the tomb of Napoleon and leaders of his armies. It is reputedly the most perfect classic monument in Paris. Napoleon's huge red marble tomb, with its scroll-shaped top, is located in the center of the basement floor. It is awe-inspiring to gaze down upon it and to remember the colorful, but sad history of the 'little corporal.'

"Paris is really a beautiful city, and fortunately, unharmed by the ravages of war and the German occupation here. Large, grand, and beautiful avenues and many parks and gardens adorn the city.

"Two of the things that thrilled me most and gave me the real feeling of being in Paris were viewing the sidewalk artists in Montmartre and visit-

ing the bookstalls along the Arc (de Triomphe at Place de l'Etoile) which was built by Napoleon as a tribute to the glories of the French armies and beheld a beautiful panorama of the city. The Arc is the Hub for twelve of the loveliest avenues in Paris.

"We went to Versailles, the lovely palace and gardens of Marie Antoinette and her Louis XVI. It was perfectly enchanting, exquisite rooms with huge gilt doors, halls of mirrors, and magnificent crystal chandeliers and the richest of tapestries, brocades, damasks, and carpets. The whole place conjured up delightful reminiscences of the history of that colorful era.

"In town once again we went through the Conciergerie where Marie Antoinette, Louis XVI, Robespierre, and others awaited their execution. Rather a ghastly feeling going through there! Not too far away is the Place de la Concorde and its obelisks with the Egyptian hieroglyphics and two lovely playing fountains.
