Draft Facers To Get Military Info Wednesday

Young men of Torrance facing future draft will receive impartial information on the advantages of all services and guidance in planning their future education and career by attending a meeting of the Citizens' Career Counseling Committee, to be held at the San Pedro YMCA Sept. 30 at 7 p.m. The committee is composed of educators, draft board officials and representatives from all branches of the Armed Forces. Elias Keeley, Selective Service representative of Southern Los Angeles, will clarify and explain the service law as it applies to young men of conscription age, and Mr. Emil L. Beck of Long Beach City College will speak on military service as it applies to education. A member of each military branch will tell briefly what his service has to offer, and the meeting will conclude with an informal counseling period during which parents and young people may talk personally with committee members. Capt. Arnold Kline, commander of the Naval Supply Depot, is chairman of the committee.

Hire Handicapped, Committee Urges Torrance Bosses

Torrance Committee for Employment of the Physically Handicapped today called upon businessmen to consider the skills and experience of handicapped workers for any jobs open during "NEPH Week," beginning next Sunday, Oct. 4, and continuing through Saturday, Oct. 10. Paul Diamond, chairman of the local committee, said that employment of physically disabled people "is good business" for the community. The worker with a physical limitation when properly selected and placed, is as good a worker and often better than an unimpaired employee, Diamond said. He asserted that disabilities do not count when the handicapped worker is placed in a job for which he is fitted. Handicapped employees are careful, interested in their jobs and less inclined to "job hopping" and absenteeism, the chairman said. Approximately 100 handicapped workers with varied skills and experience are ready for employment, Diamond said, quoting figures released by Mrs. Wil-

sona Ellis, manager of the local Department of Employment office. This office, affiliated with the United States Employment Service, offers to employers the experience and techniques acquired over the past 20 years in matching the actual requirements of the job with the skills and specialties of the workers, the chairman revealed. "We should use the employment service and other co-operating community agencies in demonstrating the widely-accepted principle that it is good business to hire the handicapped," Diamond said.
