Walteria, Lomita Join Mining Protest

Appeals for a hearing on proposals to open a diatomaceous earth mine at Crest Rd. and Crenshaw in Rolling Hills will be presented to the County Board of Supervisors on Oct. 29, it was announced yesterday following a meeting of homeowners in the area of the planned mining operation.

Following a meeting earlier this week, Ernest Hahn, president of the Rolling Hills Community Assoc., said homeowners in Westfield, Eastfield, Palos Verdes Dr. East, Lomita, and Walteria have joined in preparing the protest.

The Palos Verdes Corp. recently was issued a special permit by the County Regional Planning Commission to mine the valuable earth on a site at Crest Rd. and Crenshaw.

Hahn said requests for public hearing have been sent to the Board of Supervisors with a study of the appeal slated for Oct. 29.

If the board accepts the appeals, it will order the Regional Planning Commission to set a date for public hearing. Homeowners allege dust from the open-strip mining operation would cover the area and also that the fine dust is harmful to health.
