**Letter From London
Vacationing Albert Fishes Glimpse British Royalty**

Mr. and Mrs. Ronald H. Wieg, 1846 Middlebrook Rd., got a vicarious look at London this week when they received a letter from her mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. Albert Fish, 1719-C Cabrillo Ave. The Fishes, who planned for the English capital Oct. 29, will spend three months touring many points of interest on the European and African continents. Highlight of the trip will be a visit with their daughter and son-in-law, Lt. and Mrs. Van H. Barnard, in Tripoli, Libya, North Africa. The local travelers arrived in London Nov. 3. "A tail wind just blew us across at 300 miles per hour—1700 ft. altitude. It was smooth and calm. We were in Boston one and a half hours and in Shannon 50 minutes. Ireland is so green and beautiful from the air—also England—the hedge rows between fields make it look more like a mosaic than our farmed areas at home," Mrs. Fish wrote. "On Saturday the visibility from the Empire State Building was 25 miles. We visited the United Nations Building, and with respect for the United Nations has increased immensely. "We had no trouble with customs. Our representative met us and brought us to our hotel—very comfortable—and dig this—across from Buckingham Palace. Our room is large, twin beds, private bath, lots of hot water, but the heating is only about five degrees warmer than outside. Our bathtub is the largest I've ever seen. 


