The Warriors retained their first division spot in conference standings by defeating East Los Angeles Huskies by the score of 12-0. The victory was unimpressive as the Huskies held the Warriors scoreless for three quarters allowing them to score in the second quarter only.

El Camino's first score came as a result of Don Greco's four-yard plunge through the center of the line. A few moments later Billy Crawford tossed a 15-yard pass to Stan Becker in the end zone for the final score of the game.

Ken Swearingen played his usual outstanding game. Ken carried the ball for 30, 28, and 44 yards, and also sparked the Warriors' first scoring drive while substituting at quarterback.

The Warriors discovered a new punter in Ed Norm Becker. He punted twice averaging 41 yards per kick. His first kick rolled out of bounds on the Huskies' 2-yard line.

The Huskies were unable to penetrate the Warrior front line, being held twice from scoring with the ball on the two-yard line.
