

New Loop Plans Sale of Decals

Uniforms for 'Babe Ruth' Players to Arrive Saturday; Bacon Adds Name to Sponsor Roster

Babe Ruth Leaguers will jump into their spanking new uniforms Saturday morning and will fan out over Torrance to sell decals to provide equipment funds for the new baseball league.

Decals will be sold for 50 cents each and proceeds will go toward purchasing bats and balls.

A downtown parade will be held June 19 to hail the opening of the new league here and exhibition games will be played that afternoon at Torrance Park. League play opens the following day.

The Seals have finally gotten a sponsor, according to W. F. Pearsey, players' agent, Bacon's Ford Sales in Hermosa Beach will underwrite the Seals.

Coke Supplies Scoreboard

Pearsey also announced that the Coca Cola Company will build a scoreboard at Torrance Park to be used by the Babe Ruthers and probably by any other teams which so desire.

Coca Cola will furnish a team trophy for the league winner and individual trophies for the members of the All-Star team, which will be chosen to compete in the district playoffs. The national finals are held each year in Griffith Stadium, Washington, D. C. The Stamford, Conn., team won the title last year.

Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz has been invited to ride in the inaugural parade June 19, after which Mayor Nicholas Drate will toss out the first ball to get the new league off to a roaring start. Each team in the loop will play two innings of exhibition ball following the ceremonies.

For Little League Grade
The league, which follows national baseball rules, is for graduates of the Little Leagues and caters to boys ages 13-15.

The opening doubleheader on Sunday, June 20, pits the Rainers against the Seals in the opener and the Angels vs. the Stars in the nightcap.



This will be held Aug. 28, afternoon and evening, with each playground displaying its best craft work, art projects and posters.
