Richard J. Andrews



Chace Asks More \$\$ from Gas Tax Fund

A strong demand that Los Angeles County Congressional delegates take concerted and immediate action for a more realistic distribution of Federal Gas Tax Funds to counties was voiced Tuesday by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Pointing out that at the present time per capita car registration in Los Angeles County is approximately one and one-half cars for every family, Chace said this means that Los Angeles County has the largest car registration of any county in the United States.

"Therefore, it stands to reason," said the Supervisor, "that we are paying the largest amount of Federal Gas Tax Funds of any county in the nation, and we are not in any way receiving a fair return of these taxes for our own needs."

The formula for the distribution of Federal funds for county roads, the Supervisor said, was originally set up in 1916 to care for the then existing large rural area.

"This formula," said Chace, "is antiquated and must be changed. We have at the present time a road deficiency program of over \$21,000,000 and it certainly seems fair that we should get back for that program a more equitable share of the tremendous amount of gas tax that our people are paying."

The Board of Supervisors unanimously supported Chace's recommendation that the Chief Administrative Officer of the County immediately get in touch with the entire Los Angeles County Congressional delegation and Senators William F. Knowland and Thomas Kuchel, and urge that they unite in an effort to seek a "more realistic distribution of Federal funds for secondary roads."

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Water Bills in Congress Said Bad for Southern California

The lives and property of millions of people in Southern California would be adversely affected by bills now pending in Congress that seek to authorize large storage reservoirs and irrigation works in the Upper Basin of the Colorado River, it was declared this week by the Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District.

This declaration by the Metropolitan Water District Board was made in a resolution expressing strong opposition to Senate Bill 1555, House Bill 4449, Senate Bill 964 and House Bill 236. These bills call for construction of water storage and irrigation works in the states of Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and New Mexico, portions of which lie within what is known as the Upper Basin of the Colorado River. Portions of California, Arizona and Nevada are in the Lower Basin.

Reasons Listed
A number of reasons are cited by the District Board for opposing the Upper Basin storage bills. The Board also drew attention to the vital interest which the four million Californians living in the Metropolitan Water District have in protecting their share of Colorado River water. It points out that:
"The Metropolitan Water District of Southern California is one of the principal contractors,

interpretations are now under attack in the Supreme Court of the United States.

"The bills do not contain adequate provisions safeguarding the quality of water in the Lower Basin and do not contain adequate controls of the operation of the vast storage reservoirs proposed needed to protect the energy output from the Hoover Power Project.

"The Colorado River Board of California has adopted resolutions opposing the said bills and stating the reasons for its opposition."
In its resolution the District Board requested the California senators and congressmen to oppose the enactment of the Upper Basin project bills. The Metropolitan Water District includes 50 incorporated cities and large unincorporated areas lying within the five Southern California counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, Riverside and San Bernardino.
