

### IN YOUR GARDEN

#### FOLIAGE PLANTS CAN BRIGHTEN DECORATIVE SCHEME OF HOME



**WINDOW BOXES ADD COLOR . . .** be sure to plant hardy flowers

Foliage plants are becoming more and more important in the decorative scheme of the modern home. And no wonder. Because with little—but proper—care on the part of any housewife or amateur gardener, these plants will thrive successfully.

Philodendrons are perhaps the most popular. There are 60 species of these, among them, many hardy plants such as the split leaf philodendron; the elephant ear (hastatus), which takes its name from the shape of its large leaf; the fiddle leaf of pandurifolium, also a large leaf type; or philodendron cordatum with a smaller heart-shaped leaf which gracefully trails from a wall pocket or climbs any support of wood or bark.

In fact, most philodendrons are climbers or trailers. If you don't like these, your florist or nurseryman will recommend other attractive and hardy types for your home.

Light and air are probably the most important factors contributing to the successful care of the philodendron, with temperature of almost equal importance. The plants must not be kept too warm or too cold—an average room temperature of 65 to 70 degrees is just about right.

Being of tropical origin a high degree of humidity is required. As most rooms are too dry, the moisture needed by the plant can be obtained by placing small

glasses of water in the soil of the container. The moisture from the water will evaporate through the leaves.

Sub-irrigation is just about the most successful form of watering the plant. Once a week the plant-er should be placed in a large bucket of water and allowed to remain until the soil around the roots and in the center of the plant is completely damp. Also, the leaves should be cleaned with water to allow proper absorption.

A humus soil is best, and it should be kept open and porous for proper drainage. Gravel, placed at the bottom of the planter will assure good drainage. An acid type of fertilizer such as Follum plant food is necessary.

With these few requirements, and proper care, the plants should produce sturdy and abundant foliage. And you'll have a beautiful garden in your home."
