Cars Must Stop For School Bus

With thousands of children trekking back to school again this month the California Highway Patrol issued a warning to motorists to be more vigilant and watchful, particularly in areas where school buses are in operation. "The law requires motorists to come to a complete stop when they approach a school bus which is standing and has its red lights flashing," the Patrol announced. "The only exceptions are when the bus is on the opposite side of a divided highway or when it is stopped at a traffic signal. If the red lights are not flashing it is not necessary to stop." The Patrol also pointed out that motorists should be watching for children walking or riding bicycles. "Be ready for the unexpected," the Patrol said.

Marine Pfc. In Maneuvers

Marine Pfc. Joseph N. Wixom, son of Mrs. Lewis H. Wixom of 24652 Moon Ave., Lomita, participated in a joint Marine-Army amphibious and airborne exercise on Okinawa Aug. 6. The major assault force, the 4th Marine Regimental Combat Team, hit Kinmu Saki beach on the southeast side of Okinawa while a company of the Army's 18th Airborne team parachuted onto Kin airfield. Carried ashore by the Army's 56th Tank Amphibious Tractor Battalion and supported by aircraft from Marine Fighter Squadron 224, the assault force drove inland to join forces with the paratroopers. The Marine Combat Team was backed by 3rd Marine Division tanks, artillery, engineers, and service units. The 4th Marine Regiment, a unit of the 3rd Marine Division, is based at Camp Nara, in southern Honshu, Japan. The supporting units came from various camps throughout Japan for the assault on Okinawa.

Registration Opens Sept. 13 At Harbor JC

Registration for the fall semester at Harbor Junior College will be held on Sept. 13 and 14, with classes to start Sept. 15. William M. McMaisters, Dean of Admissions and Guidance, has announced. On Sept. 13, Beta, Gamma, and Delta students only will be registered, while on Sept. 14 all new students (Alphas) will be enrolled along with any Beta, Gamma, or Delta students who could not register on Sept. 13. Registration hours on both days for regular day students will be from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and for extended day students (late afternoon and evening) from 6 to 8 p.m. New regular day students who have not completed the three-hour battery of guidance tests required for registration can do so on Monday, Sept. 13 at 1 p.m. or on Tuesday, Sept. 14 at 9 a.m. or at 1 p.m. Persons eligible to enroll in classes at the local college include any person 18 years of age or older, veterans taking training under federal or state laws, or high school graduates under 18 years of age, and students can enroll for either technical training, business training, or college preparatory work, McMaisters said.
