

Single Thumb Print Leads Detectives to Burglars

A single fingerprint found on a broken piece of glass at the scene of a burglary was the undoing of a Los Angeles man last week, as he was found guilty in Superior Court.

Blackmon Prince, 30, will appear for sentencing in three weeks after he was found guilty of burglarizing a liquor store at 18178 Hawthorne Ave. last May 25.

At the time of the heist, Torrance Detective Sergeant Percy Bennett found a broken piece

of glass which showed a clear print of a thumb.

Virtually at the same time, Los Angeles police officers were arresting Charles Hildneith, 28, in a downtown apartment house. Liquor bottles found in the apartment matched those taken from the Torrance store.

A roundup of Hildneith's associates turned up Blackmon, whose thumb matched the print found by Bennett.

Hildneith also has been found guilty of burglary in Superior Court.

Prince has filed petitions asking for probation.

Lesson-Sermon Topic Revealed

Serial numbers of the bonds have been reported to the Treasury Department, police said. Fourteen were Defense Bonds of the \$25 denomination, and two other bonds were \$250 corporation stock issues.




