

Pool Sufficient For Future Need

There may be questions in the minds of some people whether the swimming pool planned for Torrance is large enough. Or is it too large? Actually, the swimming pool has been designed to meet the needs of Torrance for some years to come. It has also been planned to meet the maximum population figures for Torrance. It is designed to comfortably accommodate a maximum peak load of almost 700 people or a daily load of nearly 3000 people.

Thus, it will be possible to accommodate, each day, approximately 3 per cent of the total

population of Torrance when the city reaches the 100,000 mark. A pool of the size planned for Torrance will be one of the largest in Southern California, on a par with Belvedere pool, the Garvey pool in East Los Angeles, and the pool in Culver City.

Shallow Pool Good
Authorities generally agree that 75 to 80 per cent of the pool area should be less than five feet deep. The pool designed for Torrance meets these requirements with special consideration given to the fact that there are a greater number of swimmers in this area than in other parts of the United States. The pool planned for Torrance

is in keeping with the trend to increase the area that can be devoted to swimming instruction and bathing as opposed to having a vast area of deep water that only experienced swimmers can use. It also will have a large deck area for sunbathers.

Versatile Facilities
In addition, the bath house is designed so that it can be used for various other recreation activities when it is not being used in conjunction with the swimming program. It will be so constructed that it can be used as a teen-age activity center during the winter months. It can be used for community meetings and other affairs of a similar nature.

Also, the whole plant layout is designed so that it can be used for water festivals, boating and canoeing classes, beauty contests, style shows, etc. There has been considerable thought and attention devoted to designing a structure that can be used twelve months out of the year. And, above, all, it has been designed so that if the people in Torrance want to enclose the pool in a building, the work can be done at a minimum of cost.

The architect has designed the pool to serve all of the Torrance residents on a year-round basis and build it at a reasonable cost.

Rice and Frank Casserole

2 slightly beaten eggs
1 cup Pea Evaporated Milk
¼ cup water
1 teaspoon dry mustard

1 teaspoon salt
2 cups cooked rice
½ cup grated American cheese
4 frankfurters

Mix in a bowl the eggs, milk, water, mustard, salt, rice and 1 cup cheese. Put into a greased shallow baking dish holding about 6 cups. Split frankfurters lengthwise, being careful not to cut through underside. Fill frankfurters with 1 cup cheese, then arrange, cut side up, on top of rice mixture. Set baking dish in pan containing about 1 inch of hot water. Bake in 350 oven (moderate) about 45 minutes, or until knife inserted near edge of rice mixture comes out clean. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.

Citizens Committee for King Formed to Help Re-Election

Formation of a Citizens Committee to work for the re-election of Congressman Cecil R. King in the 17th District was announced yesterday by Robert Chambers, Manhattan Beach businessman.

"Both Republicans and Democrats in this area are proud of King, who has earned the title of California's Most Distinguished Congressman, represents the 17th District," Chambers said.
