Private cremation ceremonies were held.



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

Redondo Beach in the Torrance school district, Hull told the board.

In it, he urged them to annex the land to their school district, listing 14 reasons, some of which are:

1. If the land is later annexed by Redondo Beach, it would unbalance Redondo attendance loads.
2. School sites would be cheaper now than later.
3. Annexation would make school district and city boundaries the same.
4. If Torrance erected a school on the land, and Redondo Beach later annexed the property, there would be a problem of bonded indebtedness between the two districts.
5. Traffic problems, crossing guards, police problems, and public services would be under double jurisdiction.
6. The district might have to pay taxes both to Redondo Beach and Torrance if the school district is not annexed.
7. Since the council annexed the land, the board has a moral responsibility to take over school administration.

Hull suggested a meeting between the two boards of education to determine the problem.

The couple's Los Angeles neighbors said that they had both been in poor health recently. Dr. Opp with heart trouble, and Mrs. Opp, with diabetes. They had been despondent, neighbors said, since a recent visit to Scripps Clinic in La Jolla.

The couple left wills on the table in their home, with the key to a safety deposit box, and stocks and bonds.

Council Ups Motorcycle Police Pay

Torrance's new motorcycle policemen got a \$15 monthly pay raise this week, as City Councilmen okayed a recommendation by the Police Chief and City Manager. The added pay is to compensate for "extra uniforms, additional personal equipment, and hazard pay."

Chief Willard Haslam pointed out that Los Angeles Police officers assigned to motorcycle duty receive \$30 additional, while Manhattan Beach pays \$25, and Hawthorne an extra \$20 each month.

A request by Haslam for establishment of a standard pay schedule was rejected on the grounds that such a scale would necessitate holding a Civil Service examination each time a man was assigned to ride the motorcycles.
