Zoning Meet Set Oct. 27 At McMaster

North Torrance zoning will come up for consideration at 8 p.m. Wednesday, as members of the North Torrance Civic Improvement Assn. meet with members of the Planning Commission at a public hearing in McMaster Hall.

An effort will be made to secure at least one resident from each block in North Torrance, NCTIA president Murl Reeves indicated.

At a preliminary meeting with Reeves, Commissioner H. R. Black indicated that the city's rapid growth had led to many requests for zone variations.

The committee which he heads was appointed to study overall zoning in North Torrance, Black said, to allow a comprehensive picture of the entire area.

"A number of areas will be considered for commercial zoning," he said. "We should hear from affected property owners if zoning changes would prove objectionable. These changes would have a permanent effect on the community."




