## Locals To Visit Paramount For Half-Way Mark Game

**Locals Favored To Nip Pirates In League Tiff**

Traveling days are over for the Torrance Tartar Bees, at least for a while, as they host the Paramount Bee squad on the local high school field, today, at 2:45.

The Tartars have a win over Inglewood last week to serve as a shot in the arm for this fray, while the invaders will be attempting to overcome a precedent they established last week when they were nipped by Santa Monica, 8-7.

Line-ups for the Torrance crew will be "about standard," Coach Don Porter says, with backfield men Jim Haworth, Mike Bertolet, Billy Reeves, and Bobby Grajeda getting the nod at game time.

Craig Edmans, the powerhouse of the ball carrying foursome, will trade off with Haworth for push plays through the line.

Paramount's club operates out of a single wing with an unbalanced line, and boasts a spectacular, hard-hitting backfield, from past reports.

Others wearing the maroon colors this afternoon will be Gary Knox, Tom Kulp, Gene Daimler, Tom Koehn, Charlie Valencia, and Bob Curran.

Scoring last week in their 18-0 rout over Inglewood were Kulp, Reeves and Haworth.

### Tartars Invade Pirate's Lair

Two once-beaten teams will go at it tooth and nail tomorrow night to see who comes out on the uphill side of the Bay League Conference standing chart, as Torrance invades the Paramount Pirate lair at 8 p.m.

The locals boast a win over Inglewood, and are listed with a loss from powerful Centennial, while Paramount sparked out a 6-0 victory over Redondo, and fell to potent Santa Monica, 26-7.

From past reports, the hosts will try to make their gains through the air, and will rely on a team of Ray Shackelford at the throwing end and Bob Sheehy on the catching side.

#### Win On Passes

It was the aerial route that gave them their score over Santa Monica, plus hard defensive play which enabled the Pirates to corral the Samohi gridders with 26 points. Santa Monica is favored to capture the conference and was a heavy favorite over Paramount last week.

Coach Cliff Graybehl's attack will be built around the ball tott' abilities of Don Frattarole at the blocking back and signal calling position; Jerry Burns at right half; Skip Smith at fullback, and Al Rainwater or Sunny Steele at tailback.

Frattarole did a ship-shape job of calling signals in the last quarter of the Sentinel mix, and will get the starting job come Friday night's muster.

Rainwater Trades Off Rainwater, who scooted over for one of the two tee-dees last week, will trade off with Steele in the tailback slot. Steele is developing into a good passer, as well as a shifty runner when he gets rolling.

Frattarole, at the QB slot, also may do some aerial effort tomorrow eve should the ground gaining patterns get bogged down.

Other possible subs will be Billy Meacham at the passer's post, and Jerry Hughes filling in for Burns.

Meacham is an outstanding passer in daily practice meets, but often gets bottled up by a fast charging line. Because of his stature, he must throw quickly to avoid tall incoming foes from slapping at his passes.

Defensive stalwarts Defensively, Denny Hester, Carlos Skaggs, Jim Donnette, John Gomez, Carlos Espinosa, Tom Vanderpool, Ken Wheat, Bob Boss, Don Iwata, Roger Smith, Dorsey Gruver, Bob DuBois, Tom Sminia, Dave Coombs, and Butch Hazel probably will get a chance at the Pirates.

If things get rough, the kicking toe of Gus Sanchez will be counted upon to make those points-after-touchdown which can make or break a ball game.

Gus has an enviable record of conversions. Big ball charger for the Paramount crew is Warren Welch who punched all kinds of holes in the Seahawk line when they met Redondo.

So perhaps in more than any game in the past, both squads tomorrow night will be out to make a killing, and get a chance to stay in the running for one of the top spots in loop competition (next to Santa Monica, that is).


Hot Traveling League Bowlers Here Sunday

After plotting, charting, and tabulating, coaches from both schools consoled each other with the fact that Torrance had copped the meet, winning 25-30, to keep the local scoring record out of the red.

Myron Schmidt chugged over the grueling 1.75 mile course in 8 minutes, 59 seconds to cross the tape first for Torrance.

He was followed 12 yards back by Centennial's Bobby Harrison.

### In JC Play ECC Only Team Still Unbeaten

El Camino College Warriors, idle last week on the football scene, remain the only unbeaten, unscored on and untied junior college team in the southland, and this week will put their eleventh place national rating on the block against twice beaten Long Beach City College.

The locals will rely on Joe Contestable, 14 pass completions out of 21 attempts, and Stan Becker, 8 for 20 tries, as their two top hopefuls in the Viking encounter.

The fray will be staged at Long Beach Saturday night.

Credit for the Warriors defensive record, only 260 yards in 3 games gained against them, can be attributed to fine line play of Fabian Abrams, 205 pounder from Redondo, and All-Confer-

ence guard Jim Clark. Coach Buck Anderson of Long Beach will rely on fullback Cecil Tilley, with an 8 yard per game average, Nick Uglesich at quarterback, and Roger Hull at half to carry the brunt of the offense against El Camino.

Santa Monica City College Corsairs and the San Diego JC gridders provided upset wins last week to mark the second round of play in the Metropolitan circuit.

The Bakersfield Renegades trounced Pasadena City College in a non-league match to retain their number one National Junior College rating.

The East L.A.J.C.-Santa Monica game tomorrow will bring together the two leading Conference scorers in Chuck Longo, Huskie back, and the Corsairs' Ken Matsuda, who tallied four times against Valley last week.

Coach Joe Berry will have to come up with a varied defense if his Harbor Seahawks are to stop the devastating Bakersfield offense Saturday night. The Harbor attack will be built around Gabby Mendoza, big Bruce Bolden, and Jim Hewitt.

### Serra Bowled Over; Bluebirds Drop 8-5 Contest to Huntington Park

Serra's high school Cavaliers bowed to a powerful St. Anthony crew 30-13 on the winner's grass last week-end, in a Catholic League contest. Tomorrow the Cavaliers will host the Loyola Cubs for their third conference encounter of the season.

Late in the first quarter in their game last week, St. Anthony connected with a 20 yard pass, and turned it into a tally.

Then, on the kickoff, Serra's Jim Mullens handed off to halfback Frank McCarger on the Cavalier 14, and the speedy halfback cut for the side lines and 86 yards to pay dirt.

St. Anthony piled together another drive and tallied once again. Minutes later, Serra's Gary Norton had his punt blocked out of the end zone for a St. Anthony safety.

Another pass for 38 yards and a 6 yard center plunge accounted for the remainder of the Saints scoring during the third period.

In the final stanza, Serra opened up with an aerial bombardment. QB Dennis Carroll completed five out of eight passes for a total of 51 yards, and Bill Kelly completed three of four for 23 yards.

This set McCarger loose to hit the line for the final local tally. Serra gained a total of 254 yards to St. Anthony's 302. McCarger carried the ball 7 times for a 15.8 per carry average.

Heavy hitters for the Torrance side were few, with seven singles grading the "hits" column. Huntington Park accounted for 8.
