Lesson-Sermon Topic Told

The age-old question of life after death, and the advantages of spiritual progress are discussed in the Sunday Lesson-Sermon on "Probation after Death" in all Christian Science churches. The Golden Text from James (1:12) reads, "Blessed is the man that endureth temptation; for when he is tried, he shall receive the crown of life, which the Lord hath promised to them that love him."

Keynoting the Lesson-Sermon is this citation from Galatians (6:8): "He that soweth to his flesh shall of the flesh reap corruption; but he that soweth to the Spirit shall of the Spirit reap life everlasting. And let us not be weary in well doing; for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not."
