Although the local campaign kick-off date is timed to coincide with the go-ahead signals of all other Los Angeles Chest appeals, Mrs. Schwartz reports that she and her league of over 500 volunteers hope to follow Torrance's precedent of successfully conducting their campaign within one day. The residential quota of the \$20,179 local goal is \$11,131.

Tentative plans for achieving their goal on Nov. 4 call for a mass assembly of all volunteers at 9:30 a.m. at the YWCA, where after a brief meeting, they will form a television audience and watch the "Red Feather School House" program to be shown live over station KTLA on Channel 5 at 10 o'clock.

Following the program, volunteers will set out to contact over 40,000 residents in Torrance for their 1954 contributions to the 164 services united in the Community Chest of the Los Angeles Area.

Temporary campaign headquarters from which volunteers can conduct their activities, will be set up for the day at the YWCA, Central Torrance; El Retiro Park, Hollywood Riviera; and McMaster Hall, North Torrance.

## Marine Takes Part in Live Fire Problem

Marine Pfc. Ronald E. Higley, son of Mr. and Mrs. James R. Wilson of 4822 Mindora Dr., took part in a 48-hour live-firing problem held on the slopes of Japan's Fujiyama Sept. 18, which wound up a month of field exercises for the Marines.

The Navy reported today. Firing under conditions simulating actual combat, Leathernecks of the 3rd Marine Regiment set their sights on silhouette targets and fortifications erected on the mock battlefield.

While participating in the maneuver, the foot-troops observed a fire support demonstration from 105 mm cannons, mortars and machine guns.

The maneuvers marked the end of a series of 48-hour problems by three battalions and attached units of the 3rd Marine Regiment.

## Torrance Has Healthy Week

The week ending Oct. 16 was the healthiest one in several months for the Torrance Health District, with only 10 cases of disease reported.

The County Health Department reported four cases of polio during the week, with two of them in Torrance, and the others in Manhattan Beach and in county territory.

## Week's Building Hits \$996,194

Torrance's building permit totals continued to zoom upward, as the city missed a million dollar week by only \$4000, according to Walter Bradford, senior clerk in the City Engineer's office.

During the last week, \$996,194 in permits were granted, leaving last year's record figures far behind. Figures released this week indicated that in the amount of new building this year, Torrance trails only Los Angeles and San Diego, both of which have many times larger population.

This year's total is \$35,228,987. \$109,900

The biggest bloc of permits was taken out by the Carbon and Carbide Co. for six new buildings at 3651 Del Amo. Milton Kauffman Construction took out permits for 38 houses, valued at \$317,400, in Southwest Park.

T. Suminaga took out \$55,000 in permits for construction of a new market at 23747 Arlington Ave. Permits for Hollywood Riviera's second church, the Church of Christ, at 6122 Pacific Coast Hwy., were taken out, valued at \$39,000.
