TARTARS COME TO LIFE IN FINAL HALF

TO SMASH PIRATES

Score In Third Period Shakes Tartars Loose

Paramount High School is new to the Bay League football race this season, and after a game with Torrance last week-end, they might be wishing they were back in the good old days, and never had heard of the Bay Conference.

For the Tartar varsity grid-ders left them with a 21 to 0 lashing to give the locals their second straight shut-out. They beat Inglewood last week, 14-0.

The locals pulled their recent trick of laying low in the first half, then coming to life in the final minutes of the third period, and smashing for repeated scores.

Only excitement of the initial half was a much disputed pass-interference play called in favor of Paramount, and a galloping 40-yard pass interception by Denny Hester which was nullified by an off-sides penalty against the Tartars.

Torrance Gets Break
Half way through the third quarter, after slugging back and forth for no large gains, an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty called against the Pirates gave the Torrance crew a first and ten to go on their 24. Big Skip Smith hadn't come to life as yet in the ball game and was being bogged down at nearly every carry.

He plugged for only a couple of yards, and on second down, Sonny Steele threw to Bob Bass, incomplete. Then, Steele saw Ben Hanks clear at the 3, threw and Hanks bobbed the ball into the air, but managed to catch onto it for the first tally.

Chris Sanchez' talented leading toe provided the first of three extra points he was to make for the night.

The score set the Tartars loose, and the Torrance ball club started to click.

With 2 minutes remaining in the period, Manuel Oloque intercepted a pass on the Pirate 19. Smith crashed for 6, and another penalty gave the locals a break—and the ball on the 1. Steele jolted over for the second score.

Rainwater Rambles
After 7 minutes of the last period had elapsed, Al Rainwater, playing an exceptionally good defensive and offensive game, took the snap from center, blasted through a right tackle hole, and took off for the goal line.

At the 23, he was met by a trio of Pirate would-be tacklers, but a well-placed straight-arm gave him a free run to the goal and a tee-dee.

Working hard to contain any possible Paramount attack, the defensive forces of the Torrance varsity bottled up a serious foe threat—but had all hands mightily worried.

Paramount's Ray Shackelford hurled a short toss to Ed Bob Shehee, who button-hooked in to snap up the throw, and then made for the goal. He raced through the local line-backers, and looked like he was off and running until Carlos Skaggs made a desperate diving tackle to bring him down on the 8.

Another similar pass play punched the hosts ahead to the 2, and the locals held for another 2 downs before the gun sounded ending the threat.

Tom Vanderpool, Don Ivata and Dorsey Gruber all were sharp on defensive play, each making a couple of tackles that could have spelled disaster if missed.

Other stalwarts included Tom Sminia, Butch Hazel, Bob Boss, Ken Wheat, Jerry Burns, Don Frattarole, Jim Donnette and John Gomez.

On first down, after a 5-yard off-sides penalty pushed the ball to the 13, Craig Edmans zipped around left end for the starting score. A bad pass from center fouled up a conversion try.

Moments later, Paramount's Jim Hombs tossed a long pass to End Don Voorhees, who was clear as a bell. He roared down the field to a score, only to have it nullified by a backfield in motion penalty.

The Pirates never again seriously threatened.

Bertolet Intercepts
After half-time, both squads again started their defensive stands, and except for an interception by Torrance's Mike Bertolet on the Tartar 8, no offensive action was outstanding.

Half way through the final period, the locals' Gary Knox snaggled a Pirate pass and made it back to the 48 before he was stopped. Edmans roared to the 26, and then went over for a tally, only to have a holding penalty call it back.
