## County Gets Afternoon Burning Law

New hours for incinerator burning in the unincorporated areas of Los Angeles County will be from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. daily, according to action taken Wednesday by the Board of Supervisors.

Supervisor Burton W. Chace said the Board's action was for a 90-day period and conforms with a similar action on the part of many cities of the county. He said the results of the effects of the new burning hours will be studied carefully by the Board, before a permanent ruling is made. Chace said the action was taken on the recommendation of County Fire Chief Keith E. Klinger.

The Board also gave Klinger the authority to suspend all incinerator burning in sectors located within 500 feet of mountainous, brush or grass covered areas of the County during periods of high fire hazard. "I was happy to support this experiment," Chace said, "but did so with misgivings on two points—will it increase the fire hazard—will the housewife be so occupied in the preparation of the evening meal that she will be unable to supervise incinerator burning?"

A similar proposal was considered recently by the Torrance City Council, but was tabled without adoption. The Council pointed out at the time that the city provided house-to-house collection service for combustibles.

## NEWS FROM NEARBY

A hearing on a proposed formation of the South Bay Hospital District has been continued until Nov. 16 by the Board of Supervisors. At that time, the supervisors will discuss a request by the Southern California Edison Co. to exclude its Redondo Steam Plant from the district's tentative boundaries. The plant represents 28 per cent of the total assessed valuation of the district.

A hearing on a resolution to annex territory to the Dominguez Sewer Maintenance District has been set by the Board of Supervisors for Nov. 30. The territory to be annexed is in the vicinity of 223rd St. and Vermont Ave.

The State Public Utilities Commission Thursday granted the Southern California Gas Co. an annual gross increase of \$7,520,000, allowing six per cent return on their investment. According to the Commission, this will add 5.8 per cent on the average consumer's gas bill.

When a man posing as a representative of a finance company offered to settle her \$550 account with the firm for \$150, Helen Rankin of Harbor City thought the deal sounded a little strange. She told San Pedro police about the offer and Officer Harry Bailie provided her with marked bills to make the deal. Jailed on suspicion of burglary after he accepted the bills was Edmond Panek, who told police he had been an employee of the finance company until last week.


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
