

## New School Bids Due Next Week, Will Provide for 16 Classrooms

Good news from the Torrance Board of Education centers on the elementary school to be built in our tract. Emmet Ingram, business manager of the Torrance schools, announced that bids will be received on Jan. 21 for the construction of the school. Included in the announcement was a statement by Ingram that they hope for completion of the school by next September. The building will be of frame and stucco and hold 16 classrooms with space for two kindergarten units, shop, home economics departments, and a lunch parlor.

Two pioneer Southern California business men, Theodore J. Van de Kamp and Lawrence L. Frank, will be honored next Tuesday, Jan. 11, on the 40th anniversary of the founding of their firm, Van de Kamp's bakeries. Starting with a single potato chip store in 1915, and a total capital of \$200, their present annual gross income is in excess of \$18,000,000. The civic celebration, to be held at the Hotel Statler, will be a luncheon meeting sponsored by the Advertising Club of Los Angeles. Members of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce and its Women's Division, civic officials, plus important segments of the food industry will participate in honoring these two citizens.

The school will be located on a 10-acre site at Newton Ave. and Nancy Lee Lane and will cost between \$300,000 and \$350,000. Thomas J. Russell, architect of Long Beach, prepared the plans.

#### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

#### Toffee Nut Bars

2 cups sifted, all-purpose flour 1/2 cup fat  
1/2 teaspoon salt 2 packages semi-sweet chocolate pieces  
1 1/4 cups brown sugar 1/2 cup finely cut, unsalted nuts  
Sift flour and salt together onto a piece of paper. Put shortening into a 2-qt. bowl. Mix in brown sugar until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat hard. Stir in 1/2 of flour mixture. Then stir in a mixture of milk and vanilla. Stir in rest of flour mixture. Spread dough in ungreased pan measuring about 10 x 15 in. Bake on rack slightly below center in 350 oven (moderate) about 25 minutes, or until brown. Remove from oven and sprinkle chocolate pieces over top. Bake 3 minutes longer. Remove from oven. Spread melted chocolate evenly over top of cake. Sprinkle top with nuts. Cut into 1 1/2 x 3-in. bars while still warm. Cool in pan. Makes 35.
