1 can cream of mushroom soup

COUNCIL BRIEFS

(The following matters of business coming before the Torrance City Council on Jan. 11, 1955, were not included in the HERALD's Thursday edition because of space limitations. Complete coverage of tomorrow evening's Council meeting in brief form will be published on Thursday.)

Ordinance 727 amending and repealing the city's Civil Service ordinances and adopting a single comprehensive personnel ordinance introduced and adopted at its first reading. Mayor Dralle and Councilman Benstead proposed the new ordinance.

City Manager George Stevens was authorized to proceed with purchase of the 28-acre civic center site north of Torrance Blvd. between Maple and Madrona from California Western Oil Development Co. for \$6500 an acre—the offered price of the land a year ago. The land was appraised as of March, 1954—date the city initiated condemnation proceedings—at \$7500 an acre and is now valued at about \$9000 an acre, councilmen were told. The city will refund the 1954 taxes (about \$1700), pay for removing oil wells on the property, and pay for moving an acre line as conditions to the purchase of the property at the \$6500 an acre price.

City Attorney Hall reported that Elmo Buttle, chief of the surplus real property branch of the General Services Administration in this area, had told him that he would approve the city's request to clear oil and mineral rights on the 28-acre airport triangle proposed for commercial development. A formal approval of the matter will be submitted by Buttle when he returns to his San Francisco office, he indicated to city officials.

A new ordinance replacing one recently adopted by the Council providing a "hold harmless" agreement for the Moneta Water Co. in the proposed transfer of water service to north Torrance tracts to the Torrance Water Department will be presented to the Council at its next meeting. City Attorney Hall reported.

A letter from Police Chief Haslam recommending that the city adopt a system of ticketing parking meter violators through the use of a self-addressed, postage-paid envelope read to the Council and approved.

City Manager Stevens was requested to survey the possibility of leasing city-owned property at Torrance Blvd. and Western Ave., and make a recommendation to the Council at an early date.

Patricia Nelson, secretary in the City Clerk's office and recording secretary of the city employees' union, was told in response to her question that the adoption of comprehensive personnel ordinance was considered an urgency measure when it was presented to the Council last week because the city did not now have a Civil Service appeal board. The present Civil Service Board was stripped of its power to sit as an appeal board by recent Council action.

The Council adjourned after authorizing that all bills properly audited be paid. It will convene again at 5:30 p.m. Jan. 18.

Great Lakes Carbon Names Two Officers

Election of Michael E. Puyans as vice-president, finance, and William O. Ashe as treasurer of Great Lakes Carbon Corp. was announced yesterday by the firm's board of directors. Puyans was formerly vice-president and treasurer, and Ashe was assistant treasurer. Puyans joined Great Lakes Carbon as treasurer in 1945 after 18 years with the New York Trust Co. in various capacities. He was elected vice-president in 1950.
