She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Brown, Jr., of 823 Faysmith Ave., and had been a respirator case when she entered the hospital last November. Margaret's father is employed by the Los Angeles City Board of Education.

Since the Sister Kenny Polio Hospital opened in 1950, 749 polio victims have undergone Kenny treatment, according to Mrs. Royal C. Penner, of 1216 Tori Ave., and Mrs. Edward Osborne, of 1208 Maple Ave., both of whom are Sister Kenny Community Relations Council members in Torrance.

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
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


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
