DIAL "81" FOR LONG BEACH

Some of our Torrance extended dialing customers with one- or two-party service have experienced difficulty in placing calls to Long Beach. Remember, you cannot dial Long Beach numbers direct at the present time. THE CODE "81" MUST BE DIALED FIRST and then the numerals only of the Long Beach number. DO NOT dial the letters "L" and "B." The code "81" takes the place of the prefix in this instance. If you have been dialing the Long Beach prefix you have probably been getting wrong numbers, as the "L" and "B" on the dial are in the same spot as "1" and "A," which is the prefix for Lafayette numbers. If you have a four-party line however, calls to Long Beach must still be placed through the "O" Operator.
