

# Horse Racing Taxes Should Go To General Fund, Chapel Says

The state tax on horse racing is divided into various items, the most interesting of which is the allocation for fairs and expositions. This is a well-known scandal, but it does not reflect upon the managers and owners of the race tracks.

A good example is a small community fair which has, let us say, a total of 5000 paid admissions in five days of operating time, and yet it receives an allocation of \$20,000 out of the fairs and expositions fund, which in turn receives its money from the state tax on horse racing. In other words, the tax payers of the State of California, including you and me, are paying the fair association \$4 for each man, woman and child who pays for a ticket to the fair.

I do not think that this is honest or logical. I have proposed amendment to the State Constitution which says that all of the state taxes on horse racing must go into the general fund of the state. This bill of mine will be opposed by Assemblymen and Senators who come from districts where the fairs and expositions benefit from the present arrangement.

If you think I am right, it will accomplish nothing by writing to me, but if you have friends in other assembly districts, write to them and tell them what you think.

If you live in San Pedro, Wilmington and the adjacent territory, write to the Honorable Vincent Thomas. The address when we are in session is simple.
