**Torrance Drilling Rigs Probe Depths of New Guinea for Oil**

In a jungle area in Papua, on the island of New Guinea, the Australasian Petroleum Co. is using American equipment in drilling a test well which may be run below 15,000 feet.  
An Ideal Type 50 Rig, made by the National Supply Co. of Torrance was used for the first 7500 feet. To reach the greater depths required, this has been replaced by a larger Ideal Type 130 Rig.  
In addition to importing much of its machinery and equipment from the United States to Port Moresby, the Australasian Petroleum Co. must carry it an additional 270 miles across the Gulf of Papua and upriver, using a small, shallow draft freighter. The test operations are up the Omati River, where docking facilities have been set up.  
The area is a hilly one, covered with dense forest. Many trees had to be cleared away to provide a camp site. Warehouses and shops are built on graded level spots, but following the customs of the country the houses and the club are built on posts along the hill sides. Personnel transportation is by Land Rover, a vehicle resembling a Jeep but with the steering on the right-hand side.  
The first well in the area, Omati No. 1, was originally drilled to 13,700 feet, but because of some difficulties the hole was sidetracked and is now being drilled at about 12,000 feet. This operation is with an Ideal Type 100 Rig, powered by two Superior PTD-8 Diesel engines with Gyrol couplings. Two Ideal Type C-250 slush pumps also are used.  
Omati No. 2 is about four miles further in the hilly jungle. The original 12-inch hole drilled with the Type 50 Rig was opened to 17 1/2 inches down to 5600 feet and 5500 feet of 13-3/8-inch casing was set.  
Power for the Type 50 Rig was provided by two Superior PTD-8 Diesel engines with Gyrol couplings. Independent mud pump equipment consisted of two Ideal C-350 slush pumps, powered by Superior PTD-6 Diesel engine with a Gyrol coupling. This same "pump house" equipment is now being used with the Type 130 Rig.  
The Type 130 Drilling Works, which is powered by a two-section drive group using Superior PTD-8 Diesel engines with Gyrol couplings.  
The Type 50 Rig was used to lift the sections of the Type 130 Rig into position. The end of the drilling line was then spooled onto the drum of the Type 130 Rig and the blocks were used to remove the Type 50 Draw Works and its two-section drive.

**MILLIONAIRE TOPPLES FROM SUMMIT OF WORLD FINANCIAL EMPIRE**  
NEW YORK—March 31—Bjorn Faulkner, Swedish tycoon who rose from the slums of Stockholm to build a financial empire girdling the world, plummeted to his death late last night from atop the twenty-story skyscraper he had constructed as a symbol of his invulnerability and success.  
Faulkner, who had only recently celebrated his forty-fifth birthday by adding a forty-fifth corporation to his list of holdings, fell, or may have been pushed, according to police, from the luxurious penthouse gardens which adjoin the lavish apartment now occupied by Faulkner's one-time business associate and secretary, Karen Andre.  
Miss Andre, known to some of the Faulkner clients as the Norse Dragon, was with Faulkner at dinner at the Stork Club and appeared shortly after his death among the horrified witnesses on the sidewalk at the foot of the Faulkner Tower. She is being held for questioning.  
Bjorn Faulkner's widow, the former Nancy Whitfield of Newport and Brookline, Mass., was contacted by reporters at her Long Island mansion, but refused to answer questions. Her father later released to the press a statement that she was "shocked and shaken" and has been put under the care of a family physician.  
Police have begun an intensive investigation of circumstances leading up to Faulkner's sudden and mysterious death.
